Objections to his license included selling to minors, to intoxicated persons and the statement that Pleas antville does not need a liconsed hotel. Stelses refuted the charges, producing good evidence that he has been conducting the place in a reputable manner, in accordance with the law. Witnesses proved that the intoxicated persons seen in the vicinity of the hotel were for the main part people who had come over from Atlantic City on the trolley line, which discharges its passengers at the hotel. Stetser said he refused to serve such persons, a state ment that was borne out by other testimony. He will enter another application in the new

He agreed that the work should be started as speedily as possible and assured his power to have everything in readiness to award the contract in June.

At an adjourned meeting of the Board, held yesterday at the New Rodney Hotel, Pleasant ille, Chairman Jeffers was authorized to ad vertise for bids as soon as the Commisione has approved the plans.

Engineer E. D. Rightmire was instructed to survey Liverpool Avenue in Egg Harbor City he State having aproved the resolution of the Freeholders to take over this road, which con neets two County roads.

An inspection was made of the Shore Road yesterday, with Commissioner Stephens, who will render his opinion in time for action at the next meeting.

Commissioner Stephens is also eager to have the Main Street through May's Landing improved at an early date and is considering the advisability of some better material than gravel, as this road connects five important County boulevards and travel over it is heavy Engineer Rightmire has not completed his survey but will finish the work in the new future and the plans will be submitted to the
