Judge Cole Settles Dispute.

Judge C. E. Cole sat here yesterday to settle a law suit between Michael Mignogna and Ottoville Beldorn of Minnesota, in which the former endeavored to collect \$50 he claimed was owing on certain building for the latter. The defendant proved to the court that work was done in a defective manner and that the \$50 was extra work incurred in getting the original work in shape, and Judge Cole awarded a verdict in favor of the defendant. Lawyer Bourgeois' Father Dead.

George A. Bourgeois, Sr., builder and contractor of Ocean City, father of Congressman George A. Bourgeois of Atlantic City, and Freeholder Anderson Bourgeois of Egg Harbor, died early Tuesday morning at his home, following a sudden attack of apoplexy. His son was called from the court room on Monday to the bedside. Deceased was 75 years old. There are six children in the family and this is the first death.

Another Forest Fire Along River.

A barn on the fish property was destroyed and the house was saved only by hard fighting. For a time the residence of Joshua Hayes was in serious danger. SCRUB GAMES ENTERTAINED CROWD OF CAPITAL FANS

Two Exciting Contests Develop Into Running Exhibition for Visitors.
