PRESIDENT TAFT WILL SPEAK HERE MONDAY

FIRST EXECUTIVE TO VISIT COUNTY CAPITAL,

Hundreds of Residents Gather To Greet Nation's Head — Grand Mass Meeting and Reception To Be Held In Atlantic City.

In the wind-up of his campaign for renomination, President William Howard Taft will speak at May's Landing Monday afternoon next from the platform of his special train, on his way to Atlantic City, where a grand mass meeting will be held.

President Taft will be the first United States executive who has ever visited the County Capitol and a large crowd is sure to assemble in honor of the event. Aside from the political import of his visit, the occasion will be a monumental one, and he will receive ovation from the people of the "Town of National Opportunities," that will cause him to remember May's Landing's patriotism for a long time to come.

At eight o'clock Monday evening the President will speak at the Million Dollar Pier, Atlantic City, after a dinner and reception at the Marlboro-Bethelton. Judge Allen Brown Edith will preside at the meeting, which promises to be one of the greatest assemblages ever held in the Queen Resort. President Taft will discuss the issues of the campaign and the needs of the country from a standpoint of sound, conservative basic principles. Admission to the pier and all seats will be free.

Memorial Day At Lenape Park.

Memorial Day will be observed at Lenape Park by an all-day program, including roller skating, dancing, merry-ground, with free rides for children in the morning, all kinds of games and races and meets served in the new dining room or in the grove.

Old Landmark On Rollers.

The law office of former Prosecutor J. E. P. Abbott, one of the landmarks on Main Street, is being moved to its new location opposite the residence of Mr. D. D. Hooper, in order to make room for the building of the new First National Bank, which recently purchased the corner property where the old building stood and will erect in the bank building within a few months. The old office building was erected in 1856 by Mr. Abbott and has been used continuously since for his practice.

Fourty-four bills introduced by him have been introduced during the same period, a number of State and almost National importance, a few of them including:

The State Employers' Liability and Workmen's Compensation Act, now being used as a sample by the National Government and in many States, insuring payment to all workers injured during employment without going to law;

Limiting work of women to ten hours per day. Heretofore there was no limit on many classes of employment;

Allowing the formation of mutual Liability Insurance Companies, thus saving thousands of dollars in premium payments to employers;

Competing the installation of safety devices around machinery in factories and workshops;

Competing the installation of apparatus to eliminate dust factories, the greatest menace to health and cause of tuberculosis;

Providing for State Commission on Employment Security, to be appointed and operating the State Departments in order to cut down expenses and increase efficiency;

Providing half rate fares on railroads to all the cities of the State, which legislature had been denied by a previous legislature;

Providing for the participation of New Jersey at the Panama-Pacific Exposition in San Francisco, appropriating a commission and appropriating money that New Jersey industries be properly represented;

Securing \$50,000 for the erection of a monument at Chestnut Neck, which has been erected and unveiled;

Repealing the unjust license heretofore imposed upon steammen and engineers, saving them the annual fee of \$2.50;

Amending the act providing for a valuation of all the railroads of the State for taxation purposes, which is now in effect, and has resulted in an increased revenue in the State of millions of thousands of dollars, making appropriations for road signs throughout the State;

Securing an appropriation for Longport Home for Incurables;

Competing the licensing of engineers in Atlantic City;

Protecting hotels and guests from misrepresentation on the part of unscrupulous dealers.

Submitting an extra Assemblyman for Atlantic County against the combined efforts of Hudson and other counties in opposition, when the Legislature was politically divided;
