# TO COUNTY FARMERS All Day Program Tubsday --- Many Pic-

afternoon last the Morris Guards and their AGRICULTURE SUGGESTIONS - AND RECENT RURAL HAPPENINGS

> In the majority of the countles of New Jersey, young peoples' organizations of different sorts such as boys' and girls' clubs and agriultural contests are being conducted. The manner of directing and financing varies in different localities, but in the main such work is under the supervision of the county Y. M. C. furnish music. There will be various races for A. authorities, the county superintendents of schools or the farm demonstrators. There has been practically no co-operation between counties, and no State-wide organization. The extension division of the New Jersey State Agricultural College hifs started a movement designed to offer organization to the various young peoples' clubs on a State basis. It is planned to standardize the local methods in ill counties desiring it, to divide counties into districts under the direction of responsible leaders who will be directed by a club leader in each county. It is not intended that the extension division shall seek to take away the leadership of the individual clubs from the local people who have done excellent work in starting them, but to make possible their or gantzation on a wider and more systematic asis for the benefit of all concerned. Such organization will provide for competition between countles in the State and between Nev Jersey and other states. In inaugurating such ment, New Jersey is following the example of other states in which the system has worked successfully.
