Witness Declares They Were Seen Where Blaze Started. Richard and Henry Oelgenbruns and Ernest Woenert, three prominent Mullica Township farmers, were arrested Wednesday on warrants sworn out by Joseph Abbott and William Abbott of the State Forestry Commission, on the charge of having maliciously started the recent bush fire which destroyed a large area of woodland in West Egg Harbor. Ten witnesses were called by the prosecution. District Fire Warden Abbott testified that on Sunday, May 11, about 5 o'clock, fire was set to a stretch of woods in West Egg Harbor, in about nine different places, only short distances apart.

The three men accused had been seen by most of the witnesses along the road where the fire had started. The road was about 100 feet wide and light that had blood existed between the Fire Warden and the accused men on account of an occurrence several years ago, when Abbott charged Oelgenbruns with overcharging the State for fire-fighting services. The majority of the witnesses testified that they had seen the three defendants riding their bicycles along the road about ten or fifteen minutes before the numerous little fires were noticed along the edge of the woods.

JURY DISAGREED AFTER TRIAL LASTING THREE DAYS St. James Church Blamed for Blaze On Electric Company.

After battling for eight hours, following a three days' trial, the jury in the case of the St. James Church against the Atlantic City Electric Company for \$40,000 damages failed to reach a verdict and was discharged. It will be remembered that the St. James Church was burned by a conflagration of which the source was unknown. The church trustees blamed the fire on faulty electric wiring and accordingly instituted suit. The trial was started Tuesday before Judge Howard Carron.

WILSON JURY REFORM FAILS LIKEWISE FREEHOLDER BILL

Promised Reforms of Democratic Party Explored.

Having failed miserably on two of the three propositions, for the purpose of considering which it was called, the special session of the Legislature, convened on May 1 last by Governor Pileler, adjourned last night at the close of Tuesday morning's last. It cost the people of the State \$10,000.

The record made by the Democratic party, the controlling party, for the special session was in accord with its actions at the regular session, Jury Reform, Constitutional Convention and Small Board of Freeholder legislation were the three propositions that the Legislature was to consider.

The Governor's bill was passed by a non-partisan vote, fifteen to three. In the House, there were only a very few votes in opposition to the Pileler bill. It was explained by the Governor as sure jury reform and he told of his provisions. Some of the Senators were inclined to think it was the best jury reform bill that had come up for the last session.

Briefly, the new bill provides that all the jurors shall be before the opening of each term of court, make up a grand jury list of 500 names for first-class counties, 300 names for second-class counties like Atlantic, and 200 names for all other counties, and a petit jury list of 700 names for first-class counties, and 500 names for second-class counties, and 300 names for all other counties.

FARMERS ON TRIAL FOR STARTING FOREST FIRES. A copy of each list shall be delivered to the Supreme Court Justice at least thirty days before the opening term, from which the Justice may strike any number of jurors and direct the sheriff to draw his grand or petit jurors from the revised list. Each name on the list shall be numbered.

PATRIOTIC ADDRESSES BY HON. WALTER E. EDGE AND CLERGYMEN.

Decorations Day Well Observed At County Capital—Old Veterans Assisted By Band Play Tribute To Departed Comrades.

Memorial Day exercises were held at the Court House yesterday morning under the auspices of Gen. William J. Sewell, Post, G. A. R. The speakers were the Hon. Walter E. Edge, State Senator from this County; Rev. Father Thomas F. Hennessy, pastor of St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church; Rev. John W. Lynch, pastor of the First M. E. Church and the Rev. Robert S. McKee, pastor of the Presbyterian Church. At the request of the Post, Mr. Ira T. B. Smith acted as chairman of the meeting. The Court House was well filled and the audience listened with close interest to a most interesting program.

Prior to the exercises, the Grand Army veterans assembled in the local cemeteries and with the assistance of the County Capital Cornet Band rendered their annual tribute to their departed comrades. Their services were witnessed by a number of residents.

NEW EVENING TRAIN BOON FOR MILL EMPLOYEES Supt. Bucklew Decides To Stop 7.15 Express At Court House.

Supt. James Bucklew, of the West Jersey and Seaside Railroad Company, has decided to improve the evening train service at the County Capital by having the 7.15 Atlantic City evening express stopped regularly at the Court House Station, beginning with the Summer schedule the latter part of June. This is a long-needed train and will be a boon for mill employees, who have been unable to use the 6.25 train as they are employed until six or eight. The 7.15 train is one that will be more convenient for all residents and there will be a much greater travel to the seashore evenings when the new train is placed in service.

The need of this improvement in the train service and the certainty of its proving a paying one for the railroad was brought to the attention of Supt. Bucklew by Mr. Ira T. B. Smith, Secretary of the Board of Trade, whose statements were corroborated by Station Agent Chris. Ebersparger. Mr. Smith also called the superintendent's attention to the need of a later train out of Atlantic City evenings, especially Saturday and Sunday, in order that residents along the Seaside branch can attend Atlantic City theatres and not have to leave before the plays are over to catch the eleven o'clock train. An effort is also being made to have the 3.15 p. m. South-bound train stopped for the convenience of Court visitors and other having business at the County offices.
