Honor and glory will be theirs who come forward voluntarily next Tuesday to offer themselves to the government in whatever capacity they may best serve. The U. S. sign of the "draft" in the selective conscription law is the principle of the right and justice, that to the shoulders of all who share the nation's burden should fall the duty of its protection. Some can serve best at home in the factory or on the farm and there will be as patriotic, though perhaps not as glorious, a duty as that of the men who are called to shoulder arms. In stead of each man deciding for himself wherein his duty lies, the government will assume this responsibility. Everyone who registers voluntarily to placing his services at the disposal of his country and is really a "Volunteer". Shameful indeed are the efforts of a tractarian individuals in other parts of the country to interfere with the enrollment of the nation's youth. Citizens can always find excuses, but they evade their duty and they are always eager to urge others to join them; their efforts will not appear so good. Trainers all they are giving, indirectly through it may be, aid and comfort to the enemy. The greater part of these efforts are inspired by secret agents of the enemy, who always find tools to lead behind. Get your name on the Roll of Honor, young man! Answer the Roll of Honor to be asked you faithfully, honestly and face the future with your head erect. You can be sure that you have done your duty, that you are ready to do whatever other duty your country may decree. Good sense and patriotism are combined in the advice of the Executive Committee of the Public Enemy League, that the teaching of the German language in our public schools be discontinued. What use have our American boys and girls for Kultur, as evidenced in the instance of the German language and other "other examples"? Of the few more pupils graduated from our high schools since the study of German was added to the curriculum, there is not one who has become practical use of the instruction, unless it be a few of German ancestry who learned the language in their homes. They can learn more German by reading the newspaper reports of one day's atrocities than they ever dreamed of in school. One of the best pointed men in school affairs in the county declared a few days ago: "I have always felt that the teaching of German in our schools was only a waste of time and effort, and a practical use to the pupils." We have since heard that sentiment repeated by other school officers. If a foreign language must be taught in the public schools, let it be Italian, Spanish or French, say of these are the languages of the boys and girls who are preparing for business. Even if the present course enabled pupils to speak the language, especially well, which it does not, under existing conditions, what American parent would want his child to learn a German language in this country might take a child in such an accomplishment, but it must be done in a practical way. The children of our schools, except the offspring of Italian, Polish, Russian and other nationalities, are all American-born. Why force German on them all indiscriminately? With this country at war with Germany, patriotism demands that the study of the German language be stopped at once. The people demand it and school officers will do well to heed their voice. There never was more justification for its study and there is absolutely none at all now.
