# TEMS OF INTEREST

**AGRICULTURE SUGGESTIONS** AND RECENT RURAL HAPPENINGS

Nitrogen hastens stalk growth; phospho acid and potash push forward the maturing of the crop and the filling of the car. In the face of this, their own statement, the fertiliser manufacturers show a uniformly reduced potash content in corn fertilizers for March dan Church plo-nic and a High School in January 1915. The mixtures they suggest in January 1915. are, as far as potash is concerned, prohibitive in price, even if they are obtainable.

Growing crops "want what they want, when they want it." War and famine prices are not their business. The care will not fill, if the right proportion of potash to phosporie acid in not maintained. Only as many kernels are produced as one get these elethents at the rate of ten to sixten. Buying corn fertilizer, with ments disturbed, is throwing away money on useless phosphoric sold, unless the correspond-

ing potash comes from somewher It can come from the soil if it is displaced from its acid combination by another elemen that will take its place and free it into the sol water. Like potash, this element must be a base, namely lime. Farmers do not lime generally for corn, but under present conditions, tis essential. Doing so will insure the crop, without adding to its cost.

No more practicable method of winning back the birds to the gardens, fields and parks. where their presence and services are so much to be desired, can be adopted than the building and setting up of houses which they will orcupy during the Summer or nesting season.

It is well to bear in mind that the birds, though discriminating in their selection of a home or nesting site, are not exacting as to style of architecture or cost of material of such dwellings. There are certain emential points ( to be observed in the erection of houses, some of which are:



Honesty and fulthfulness to duty are the two characteristics that won for Malcolm Woodruff his gradual promotion to the head of the resort's police. For eighteen years he trammed the streets of the city as a patrolman, then was served three years as Captain bek the responsibilities of Chief of Police. In all his years of service there has never been the alightest blemish on his record, though undoubtedly his slightest acts have been gone over a score of times by reformers in the periodic upheavals that have agitated the carried him through many times of stress when factional strife rent the populace of the city and made his position anything
