In spite of the in-element weather quite a number of ladies were on hand and profited greatly by Miss

While explaining the various methods of canning, the specialist put up cans of beau, peak spinach, ssparagus, pineapple, etc., and her work was a revelation to many present for its simplicity and effectiveness. When canned, the vegetables retained their original green color, their form and flavor to a remark-

Some of the more notable points brought out by Miss Hauser were as follows:
Do not put cold water on vegetables you are about to can. Cold water brings out the julce and lakes away the flavor. Use bot water

which sears the surface of the vegetables and makes them retain their julces. May's Landing Boy Attends School Nine Years Without Missing. In order to keep strawberries from raising to the top of the own, let them work overnight is their latest before canning, stirring occusion

and greatly improve their flavor. Pineapples are not indigestible if treated right. They contain popsin, which is an aid to m. This pepsin is killed by too much sugar or too much cooking. Do not cut, pineapples. After taking off the skin and eyes, begin at the bottom and tear away small pleases on the core. Canned pineupples are one of the best things known to ward off sore throat,

Hot water is not boiling water. If you haven't a thermometer, be sure the water is at boiling point by letting it boil ten minutes after it begins to "bubble," and count your


