### CAUTIONS URGED AGAINST HOG CHOLERA OUTBREAK

Hog cholers was especially destructive last rear, and the animal husbandman of the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station diects the swine owner's attention to the importance of sanitation as a means of its prerention. A strict quarantine for at least three weeks should be provided in case any new nimals are brought on the farm. The serum alone treatment establishes immunity for a rery brief period, varying from three weeks and Sunday School at the usual hour. In the to possibly six weeks. Hence it is not recom-mended that the serum be used unless there is an outbreak of hog cholera in the immediate od, or directly in one's own herd. If there is danger of the disease the swime owner should get in touch with either his County Agent or the Experiment Mallon, and

Anissale confined in close pens and the attendant filthy quarters are more subject to the disease than pigs permitted to forage on such crops as raps, oats and pear, clover, or combination mixtures of such freds. 
