#### JERSEY CROP OUTLOOK **600D SAYS FRANKLIN DYE** Peaches Give Good Promise---Potato

Acreage Fails Off.

Franklin Dye, Secretary of the State Board of Agriculture, reports that the potato acreage is greater than last year by 80 per cent. in Passaic, 10 per cent, in Sussex, Hunterdon Monmouth, Atlantic and Middlesex Counties A reduced acreage is given in Cape May 30 per cent.; Salem 40 per cent.; Gloucester 25 per cent.; Cumberland 20 per cent.; Morris Somernet and Burlington 10 per cent. each. In almost every report corn, potatoes and truck crops have been planted earlier than usual, owing to early warm days; but as cool, wet weather followed during May, growth ha not been as rapid as usual. With the advent 2.898.090 of June and abundant supshipe, it is expected 5,543.454 rapid growth and development of all crops having a good stand will occur.

Present appearances indicate a full average yield of market garden crops. Exceptions are slow germination of the smaller seeds, owing to cool weather and the prevalence of various insect pests in some few localities. Peaches at present give assurance of an

abundant crop. Old trees that were overloaded last year are below an average yield. With these exceptions, the outlook is encour aging for a full crop throughout the State, in orchards receiving the proper care. People Will Make The Issue.
