FROST INJURES CRANBERRIES.

Other Crops Seriously Affected By Cold Nights and Drought.

Light frosts in the lowlands recently have seriously injured the South Jersey crunberry rop and affected other crops. Coupled with the drought prevailing during the month and general low temperature nights, this has wrought considerable damage to the farmers. On the large Makepeace bog pear here it is

estimated that the frost injured the crop by anywhere from five hundred to a thousand barrels, Postmester L. W. Cramer's bog was also affected and other bogs throughout the county. The exact amount of damage cannot be accurately estimated, but the growers have hope that the late buds will have an opportunity to set and believe that a fair yield will

The drought has affected most farm crops, including tomatoes, potatoes, melons and other produce. The pights have been so cold that the plants will not grow and unless weather evening last at St. Mark's Parish House. onditions change soon the soil tillers will not have a very prosperous season.
