UNVEIL TABLET FOR PIONEER PRESBYTERIAN ELABORATE EXERCISES IN MEMORY REV. BROWN.

Handsome Tribute Erected Here Commemorating Life and Service of Well Known Divine Notable Array of Speakers.

Elaborate exercises were held Thursday afternoon at the unveiling of a handsome tablet commemorating the life and service of the Rev. Allen H. Brown, D. D., father of the South Jersey Presbytery and founder of many churches and schools in this part of the State.

Commemorates the life and the service of

REV. ALLEN H. BROWN, D. D.

A Pioneer of Southern New Jersey,

Born in New York, 1829. Died, Montclair,

N. J., 1867. Graduate of Columbian Col-

lege, 1849; of Princeton Seminary, 1843;

Minister of this church, 1846-1864 and from

1864-1862, Synodical Missionary, 1874-1887.

In 1844 he came to Southern New Jersey

and found here his work, that of

evangelist, educator and friend of the

people. A wise, patient, loving con-

siderer. He organized many Presbyterian

Churches in this State which are monu-

ments to his untiring energy and zeal.

A leader in higher education, a scholarly

and conscientious historian. Not sloth-

ful in business, fervent in spirit, serving

the Lord, rejoicing in hope, patient in

tribulations, continuing instant in prayer.

He preached Christ.
