Serious charges are preferred against cats especially those which are permitted to roam at large, by the Fish and Game Commission, reinforced by the Audubon Society and other organizations. In a recept statement the Commission says:

"New Jersey Grangers and other farmers organizations are unanimous in condemning the cat as a farm animal. The efficient farmer appreciates the value of protecting birds.
