Twelve to twenty-eight years in State Prison at hard labor was the sentence inflicted on Pietro Callandrio, an Italian thirty-three years of age, Wednesday last in Criminal Court by Law Judge E. A. Callandrio was convicted by a Jury after a trial which lasted nearly all day of enticing three girls, Mary Littizia Rizzi, Bessie Degregario and Annie Preston, to Atlantle City under pretense of employing them in a restaurant.

Callandrio denied the charge, alleging that the girls were brought to Atlantic City from New York and Paterson for honest purposes and that if they went wrong they did it of their own tree will and accord. The girls, however, two of whom were scarcely out of their teens and were taken from factories in New York, said that Callandrio took them direct to houses of ill repute when they reached Atlantic City, where he virtually held them prisoner and forced them to lead a life of shame. appropriating the receipts.
