The new inheritance tax act is another one which takes effect July 4. This is entitled "An act to tax the transfer of property, of resident and non-resident decedents, by devise, bequest, descent, distribution by statute, gift, deed, grant, bargain and sale, in certain cases." The tax-imposed is five percent, upon the clear market value of such property, to be paid to the State treasurer for the use of the State. Property passing to churches, hospitals, orphan asylums, public libraries, Bible and tract societies and other religious and charitable organizations, or to a father, mother, husband, Wife child or children, or lineal descendent born in lawfiii wedlock, brother or sister, or the wife or widow of a son, or the husband of a daughter, is exempt, but no other exemption of any kind is allowed. The tax is to be im posed upon the transfer of any property, realor personal, of the value of \$500, or over, and is made a lien upon the property until paid, Several laws have specified future dates upon which they shall take effect. NO SLANDER SAYS COURT.

Supreme Tribunal Upholds Demurrer of Fox and McConnell of Minotola.

In a decision handed down June 7, the Supreme Court upheld the demurrer of Higber and Coulomb, atterneys for Ward B, Fox and Norman L. McConnell, of Minotoki, against whom suft was entered for \$10,000 damages by Douglass Reed, of Newfield. Reed was represented by Thompson and Cole.

The suit grew out of remarks alleged by Reed to have been made by McConnell and Fox during the political campaign last October, charging Reed with securing the passage of an ordinance relative to telephone poles that "would cost the Township of Buena Vista \$4,000 to remove," together with other statements and to have been made.

INDUSTRY.

Annual Report of County Secretary of Agriculture Shows Successful Farming Based on Scientific Principles—Encouraging Outlook.

The annual report of the Atlantic County Board of Agriculture shows a prosperous condition of the farms of the County and contains much that is interesting and instructive. The officers of the Board are: Joseph Butterhof, President; A. J. Rider, Vice-President; V.P. Hoffman, Secretary, and William Liepe, Treasurer. The report in full follows: "The season of 1905 in many respects was a

repetition of the previous year, being also very backward, so that a number of crops showed juite a diminution in yield and quality compared with the previous year; amongst which were corn, white potatoes, apples, raspberries and blackberries, cabbages, tomatoes and cranberries. An increased yield was shown in hay, sweet potatoes, pears, peaches, grapes and trawberries.

"The grape rot which for the past few years had been less prevalent, has enlivened again the hopes of the vintner, and in consequence many abandoned vineyards have been renewed, and new areas have been planted, as it has been or is demonstrated that with the grape rot under proper control, it is a wellpaying and lasting crop, with commensurate prices for desirable varieties.

"Where in former years our wine manufacturers could obtain hereabouts all the grapes needed for manufacture, since the prevalence of the rot they were forced to obtain their main. supply from outside sources, but it seems that for the last two years this loss is being retrieved again. The magnitude of the wine industry in Egg Harbor City and vicinity may be judged that in some years as high as 100,000 gallons of wine were manufactured, and that there are al present wine vaults here, containing from 25,000 to 100,000 gallons of wine.

"The soil of Atlantic County is especially adapted for the growth of fruit, berries, sweet potatoes and truck farming, and that the is reason why-with the exception of corn-the sowing and raising of all other cereals is steadily decreasing.
