Repeat Of Injurious Democratic Legis-

deavoring To Stop Erection Of Tuberculosis Hospital By In-

Failure of the Board of Freeholders Saturday last, at a special meeting held in Atlantic City, to find a way to abrogate contracts recently entered into for the erection of a county tuber culosis hospital, at Northfield, has resulted in the people of that place taking steps to have an injunction issued by the courts halting the

Eighteen members of the Board responded to a call for the special meeting Saturday and large number of residents of Northfield and others interested in property in that vicinity attended. Freeholder Ernest Suschelford chairman of the special committee appointed at the June meeting of the Board to interview the contractors relative to a change in the mittee had been unable to make arrangements for this purpose.

Bolicitor, E. A. Highes spoke after Mr. Shackelford, giving his view as counsel for the Board that the contracts issued for the building of the hospital would be invalid at another location and that the county would be liable br damages if it stopped the work. Solicitor Highee also thought it would be illegal for the county to pay the contractors to abandon are back again in the Republican fold. their contracts. "That may be overcome, however," he added, "by personal subscriplowards a fund for the purpose of inducing the ontractors to shandon their contracts."

Ex-Judge Joseph Thompson spoke on behalf f the people of Northfield, and endeavored to have the Board change the location and also the plans for the hospital. "You are lanuing to spend too much money for the relatively few patients the county has or will county should do is to get some good location away from any built-up section and erect small individual houses, one for each patient, the way they do in New Mexico and Arizona. These small buildings cost little and can be added to as needed. They are far better than the hospital building from many points of view." Lawyer Gill, retained by the taxpayers of Northfield, spoke against the erec lion of the building at Northfield.

After several motions had been made and withdrawn and the members of the Board realized the difficulties in the way of nullifying contracts already entered into, a motion was made by Freeholder Fred Willets " to abandon the contracts for the tuberculosis hospital at Northfield provided the contractors were willing, at no cost to the Codnty." This put the Board on record as being opposed to the hospital at Northfield and in favor of knocking ou the contracts if it could be legally done with out the liability of paying damages to the contractors. Insamuch as the latter had already even refused to give a price on a plan for abandonment, the motion left the question in practically the same status as before.

Realizing the dilemma of the Board, the citi roccedings and the matter will likely get into Court before a settlement is reached. Before the Board awarded the contracts, the citizen of Northfield had a hearing before the State Board of Health and their objections were overruled. The Fresholders regarded the decision of the State authorities as final but after contracts had been awarded a new fight against the hospital was started.

CURE FOR ONION MAGGOTS

Demonstrator Shows How To Rid Fields of Pest.

While visiting farmers in different parts of the county the past few weeks Farm Demonstrator Eliwood Douglass has noticed damage of the farmers to the method of control recommended by the Experiment Station.

Few growers are aware that the adult stage of the "Onlon maggot" is a fly about the size of the house-fly, with a longer body of a buff color. There are three broods of the onion fly each Summer. Flies of the first brood lay 'eggs in April. These eggs hatch to "maggots" and pupate for another period, from whence issue the flee in May. These lay theirs eggs and a

third brood finally appears. Previous attempts at the control of this pest have been directed against the eggs or larvae (maggots) already in the ground, but the new method deviced is an attempt to kill the fiv

before she lays her eggs. The "poison bait spray" consists of 1 gallon of water, I pint of black New Orleans molame and 5 grams of sodium amenite. The amenite is dissolved in boiling water, and the molasses added. This spray is sprayed in coarse drops about the onion-fields. No attempt is made to sover the plants, but large drops should be sprinkled about so that the flies will readily bed on them and die before laying their eggs. This poison bait spray applied once a week during the rainy seasons will control the


