MAKE USE OF VACANT SOIL -OTHER TIMELY SUG-**GESTIONS** 

Already the days are begin ning to shorten and the producer of food stuffs should realize that all empty spaces must be planted to a good producing crop without delay. In fac-

during the next few days most any of the most lezirable vegetables may be n'anted with av ectations of reuping a line crop. Those vegetable plan s which may be set at once are tomatoes, cabbage, leeks, etc., while other plants such as colery, savoy cabbage, Fall letuce, kale, cauliflower, etc., need not be set intil well along in July.

Many vegetable growers fall to realize that undy kinds of Fall crops may be plauted a this time. Quite often the pext profits on the follow-up crops represent the yearly net gali of the producer. Those spaces made vacant at this time by the removal of the early vegetablos, grain and hay may be planted to such erope as sweet corn, tomatoes, carrole, b ets, turnips, Winter radishes, benns, (Winter quieb in Southorn Joney) lettuce, soup beans, sninach, etc. Therefore, the commercial grows and the truck gardener have Just as good a chance to make land produce at this late date as they would have at any other time.

The Department of agriculture tried to impress home garden people with the fact that our farmers would furnish all the quickly parish able food that could be used, and that then new producers should turn to beens, corp, cab been turning carrots and other such food pro ducts as could be cheaply stored for Winter without the use of any special containers. A mistake has been made in subjecting our farming public to loss of their usual market in ome degree when new land could have been used to help us out next Winter and Spring. Our asparagus, strawberries and some other crops are harvested from plantings made years ago and are bought less freely this year because other kinds of green food are being supplied by home gardens. And the Star Spangled-Banner in triumph doth wave O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave.



### GOVERNOR'S PROCLAMATION

Urges Men Of New Jersey To Come Forward And Fill Ranks. In order to encourage recruit-

Edge, Governor of the Mate of New Jersey, do issue this, my proclamation, respectfully urging citizens, willing to serve their country in an hour when success depends absolutely upon service; to act in the most practioni way that they give and enlist without delay in those branches or military service

"New Jersey is called upon to organize new to furnish vegetables and fruits for Summer units of the National Guard, to be Federalized to fear a competition next year that completed. There new units are 4 companies of Galloway, Mullica and Hamilton, plan of of coast artillery requiring 431 men; I battalion farms of Gloucester Farm and Town Asso, \$1, field artillery, 620 men; I brigade headquarter's detachment, 15 men; I division headquarter's roop, 96 men, a total of 1,167.

"All men between 21 and 31 years of age in New Jersey have registered and are subject to conscription in the National Army: It is reasonable to assume that when men are drafted for this National Army it will be difficult to secure transferals from one branch or division to another in order to meet the natural wishes of the individual to serve with local forces. Enlistment at this time in the National Guard affords - this opportunity. Registration under the conscription bill in nowise removes the privilege of enlistment prior to actual draft. I especially call this to the attention of registered men because I recognize that it is a source of pride and pleasure to be identified with a local organizaion. I also call this to the attention of men not registered because the privilege of enlistment extends to men between the ages of 18

The sooner New Jersey recruits her abota to the full strength in all branches of service under which licenses are granted to clubs. He the higher the mark for our commonwealth in the test of patriotism. We should reach the goal in two or three weeks. Applications for enlistment may be made to any local National Guard organization or local recruiting station. The choice of service is immaterial. The National Guards is not in competion with the the enemy policy of ruthlessness and deflauce of human rights and privileges which threatens the principles upon which our country and its free institutions were founded."


