COUNTY SEAT TO HOLD BIG CELEBRATION ON INDEPENDENCE DAY

PUBLIC MEETING AT COURT HOUSE FOLLOWS PAGEANT

REV. ROBERT ELWOOD THE ORATOR PARADE PROMISES TO EXCEL ANY HELD HERE IN PAST YEARS

BAND ENGAGED FOR ENTIRE DAY LODGES AND SCHOOL CHILDREN IN LINE OF MARCH

Independence Day will be celebrated Wednesday next by the people of the County Capital with one of the biggest demonstrations in many years, including a street parade of unusual interest and a patriotic rally at the Court House.

The parade will start at nine o'clock on Main Street to the Court House, then on to Mill Street to Second Street, thence on Cape May Avenue and back to the Court House.

Mayor Harry Wilson will act as Marshal of the parade, and requests that all those sworn in as special police, who are not taking part in the parade, assemble at the Court House promptly at nine o'clock for instruction.

The arrangements of the parade, subject to minor changes, will be as follows: Marshal, Harrison Wilson.

Immediately following the parade, which will be moved promptly, the meeting in the Court House will be held, of which Mr. Clark S. Barrett, chairman of the Executive Committee of the Public Safety League, will act as chairman.

It has been decided to adopt the plan outlined last week by Adjutant General Barber. This plan is to seek voluntary enlistments from the present home guard units for the regular guard units to be performed after the mobilization camp, and then recruit the home guard units up to the required strength from the home guard reserve lists.

It is proposed that the new national guard organization will be ready for service by July 25th, when the regular national guard organizations will go into a mobilization camp at Sea Overt.

Work of enlisting an auxiliary national guard for New Jersey will be started immediately under the direction of the New Jersey State Committee on Public Safety. The auxiliary will be drawn from the present home guard units that have been organized in every city and town in the State, and will be made up of about 6,000 men.

TIME NOW TO PLANT CROPS FOR LATE FALL

MAKE USE OF VACANT SOIL—OTHER TIMELY SUGGESTIONS

Already the days are beginning to shorten and the producer of food stuffs should realize that all empty spaces must be planted to a good producing crop without delay.

Many vegetable growers fail to realize that many kinds of Fall crops may be planted at this time. Quail often the next profit on the following crops represent the early net gain of the producer.

These crops include early potatoes, grain and may be planted to such crops as sweet corn, tomatoes, carrots, beans, turnips, winter radishes, beans, (Winter squash in Southern Jersey) lettuce, soup beans, spinach, etc.

The planting of a late crop of potatoes is rapidly becoming a popular practice in Southern Jersey. During the last part of July, the late crop for late use is planted, using such varieties as Cape May Red Skin and Mills Pride.

Truckers and gardeners rarely fail to produce all of the profitable stuff that the public can consume and the year their produce have restricted, and because less of thousands of new gardeners are producing vegetables and instead of producing them, they are producing them in the winter without the aid of containers.

The Department of Agriculture tried to impress home garden people with the fact that our farmers would furnish all the quick perishable food that could be used, and that these new producers should turn to beans, corn, cabbage, turnips, carrots and other such food products as could be cheaply stored for winter without the use of any special containers.

A mistake has been made in subjecting our farming public to loss of their usual market in some degree when new land could have been used to help to meet winter and spring crops.

Our asparagus, strawberries and some other crops are harvested from plantings made years ago and are bought less freely this year because other kinds of green food are being supplied by home gardens.

In this way financial loss is brought to the farmers upon whom the country must depend year after year, and the loss is especially heavy because there is a most inadequate supply of experienced labor and the inexperienced labor cannot be secured in sufficient amount even at extremely high prices.

All unusual crops planted to trucking crops by city and village people next Spring should grow chiefly food for the next winter, and our farmers whose regular business it is to furnish vegetables and fruits for summer use should not be driven by this summer's experience to fear a competition next year that really is unfair to men whose regular business it is to produce quickly perishable products.

Church Quarter Century Old. The little Wesleyan Methodist Church of Vineland, of which Rev. W. S. Bohneck is pastor, observed its twenty-fifth anniversary last Sunday.

The Rev. Hallock P. Schenck, of the First Reformed Methodist Church, Philadelphia, a son of the pastor, preached the anniversary sermon. The Schenck quartet, four sons of the pastor—Hallock, John, Ulrich and Addison, rendered pleasing selections.

Club Licenses Granted. Judge Shinn, sitting in the Common Pleas Court Wednesday, granted licenses to the Sea-view Golf Club and to the Chess Yacht Club.

Application was also made for a license by the Whitehouse Lodge, colored Elks of Atlantic City, but the matter was postponed by Judge Shinn, who raised the question as to whether lodge came within the provision of the act under which licenses are granted to clubs.

He will announce his decision and dispose of the application later.

GOVERNOR'S PROCLAMATION CALLS FOR ENLISTMENTS Urges Men Of New Jersey To Come Forward And Fill Ranks.

In order to encourage recruiting throughout the State, Gov. Walter E. Edge recently issued the following proclamation: "At this stage of the war every citizen must be impressed with the fact that universal service is expected and necessary to the struggle for Democracy."

Walter E. Edge, Governor of the State of New Jersey, do issue this, my proclamation, respectfully urging citizens, willing to serve their country in an hour when success depends absolutely upon service, to set in the most practical way that they can and enlist without delay in those branches of military service which are not yet fully recruited to war strength.

New Jersey is called upon to organize new units of the National Guard, to be Federalized when such units are offered and organization completed. These new units are 4 companies of coast artillery, 2 signal troops, 16 cavalry, 164 field artillery, 5 signal troops, 106 engineers' corps and 196 in the Medical Department.
