### ITEMS OF INTEREST TO COUNTY FARMERS Final Presentment Made By May

**AGRICULTURE SUGGESTIONS** AND RECENT RURAL HAPPENINGS

Because of the serious outbreak of hog sholera which occured hat Summer, the Farm Demonstrator sends out a warning to all hog raisers in the county.

In a circular issued by the Experiment Station t is stated that late Summer and Fall is the nesson for hog cholers; but the reports which ame in to the office last Summer show that the first hog which took the cholers, was dead and buried before July 4th.

Much of the inoculation last year was done by the Demonstrator and his assistants; but, to run a number of inoculating den his year, instead of visiting each farmer and inconlating his hogs. The following plan has been outlined and is approved by the Experiment Station:

hog cholers anywhere in his neighborhood, he should notify the Office of Farm Demonstration his own hogs. It is essential that this informa-tion be given in order that the Demonstrator may compute the amount of secum needed to ect these bogs. He will then write the arrange for an inoculating demonstration to which all near-by farmers who are interested may come and learn just how the work should be done and how each one may care for his own tock. It is targed that every farmer take special care to disinfect his premises with some

Faced by demands from the conductors, engineers, firemen and brakemen that would impose on the country an additional burden in transportation costs of \$100,000,000 a year, the railroads propose that this wage problem he settled by reference to an impartial Federal tribunal.

With these employes, whose efficient service is acknowledged, the railroad: have no differences that could not be considered fairly and decided justly by such a public body.

### Railroads Urge Public Inquiry and Arbitration

The formal proposal of the railroads to the employes for the settlement of the controversy is as follows:

Our conferences have demonstrated that we cannot harmonize our differences of opinion and that eventually the matters in controversy must be passed upon by other and disinterested agencies. Therefore, we propose that your proposals and the proposition of the railways be disposed of by one or the other of the following methods: 1. Preferably by submission to the Interstate Commerce Commission, the only tribunal which, by reason of its accumulated information bearing on railway conditions and its control of the revenue of the railways, is in a position to consider and protect the rights and equities of all the interests affected, and to provide additional revenue necessary to meet the added cost of operation in case your proposals are found by the Commission to be just and reasonable; or, in the event the Interstate Commerce Commission cannot, under existing laws, act in the premises, that we jointly request Congress to take such action as may be necessary to enable the Commission to consider and promptly dispose of the questions involved; or promptly dispose of the questions involved; or 2. By arbitration is accordance with the provisions of the Federal law" (The Newlands Act).

#### Leaders Refuse Offer and Take Strike Vote

Leaders of the train service brotherhoods, at the joint conference held in New York, June 1-15, refused the offer of the railroads to submit the issue to arbitration or Federal review, and the employes are now voting on the question whether authority shall be given these leaders to declare a nation-wide strike.

The Interstate Commerce Commission is proposed by the railroads as the public body to which this issue ought to be referred for these reasons:

No other body with such as intimate knowledge of railroad conditions has such an unquestioned position in the public confidence.

The rates the railroads may charge the public for transportation are now largely fixed by this Government board.

Out of every dollar received by the railroads from the public nearly one-half is paid directly to the em-

ployes as wages; and the n . ney to pay increased wages can come from no other source than the rates paid by the public.

The Interstate Commerce Commission, with its control over rates, is in a position to make a complete investigation and render such decision as would protect the interests of the railroad employes, the owners of the railroads, and the public.

#### A Question For the Public to Decide

The railroads feel that they have no right to grant a wage preferment of \$100,000,000 a year to these employes, now highly paid and constituting only one-fifth of all the employes, without a clear mandate from a public tribunal that shall determine the merits of the case after a review of all the facts.

The single issue before the country is whether this controversy is to be settled by an impartial Government inquiry or by industrial warfare.

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
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
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
