Contractor Hilpott Ready to Convert Highway Into Splendid County Boulevard-Will Cost \$26,000—Boom For Farmers.

Road Commissioner Fred, Gilkyson has signed the contract for the improvement of the years. May's Landing-Tuckahoe highway and work will be started at once by Contractor Frank Hilpott, of Red Bank, who was awarded the the contract earlier owing to the controversy one of the most popular automobile highways

In its present condition the road is dangerous for auto travel, as it is narrow, sandy, and part of it runs along steep embankments forming the dam of Estelville Lake. The road has been much used in spite of its deplorable condition and when it is converted into a wide highway will become highly popular. It will be a big boon to Ocean City, Wildwood, Cape May and other South Jersey resorts. There is no reason to suppose that it will detract from the popularity of Atlantic City with autoists, because the people who travel to the Cape May County resorts have cottages there and if they cannot go by automobile will go by railroad. Besides favoring auto travel, the new road

will be beneficial to farmers of Tuckahoe and elsewhere in its neighborhood, whose facilities for marketing their produce have been poor. The road will doubtless tenhance properly values along its course and will directly benefit Estelville, one of the best farming sections in this County. It will supply the final naising link in the good roads leading from the County Seat to every part of the State.

The requirements of the new law are well and simply expressed in the law itself, and The idea of a "sane" Fourth is in favor here, are further clearly interpreted by the regulations adopted by the department, Every motor-boat owner should comply with this new law. The requirements are simple and sane, and the law itself is the result of a considerable amount of effort on the part of the government officials and of the several associations allied to the motor-boat industry.

Motor-boats under the new law are divided into three classes: Class one, less than twentysix feet in length; class two, twenty-six feet-or over and less than forty feet in length; class three, forty feet or over and not more than six; v-five feet in length.

Lights are prescribed as follows: Class one, a white light all to show all around the horizon and a combined lantern in the fort part of the boat lower than the white light aft showing green to starboard and red to port, so fixed as to throw the light-from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on their respective sides. 




