## FIFTH TIME AT BAR, HARD LUCK TALE FAILS

Old Offender Gets Year in State Prison—Other Cases Disposed Of At Special Court Session—Rush Released.

At a special session of Criminal Court Tuesday last, Judge C. L. Cole heard several offenders and disposed of a number of cases that would otherwise have been heard over the October Term. The most important trial of the day was that of John Whiting, of Philadelphia, on the charge of perjury, of which he was acquitted by direction of the court.

Whiting's trouble grew out of a suit in the District Court, wherein Charles Butler sought an accounting of the defendant for his father's interests in the latter days then held by Whiting. Subsequently Whiting was a witness in the District Court in a suit brought by Fred Schickel against Butler and his brother, in the two instances it was alleged, did not testify truthfully. Butler then went before Judge Cole and alleged that Whiting perjured himself.

On the occasion of his fifth appearance before Judge Cole, Theodore Gray, colored, was sentenced to not less than one and not more than three years in State Prison, for the charge of assault and battery upon Margaret Price. Judge Cole recalled how Gray, on a former occasion, had sought his sympathy. The last time he appeared Gray asked that he be allowed to visit his mother in Virginia, on his promise to not re-offend. Judge Cole had several times escaped sentence.

John E. Birch, who was sentenced by term of three months in the County Jail six months ago when he broke parole, was released by Judge Cole after serving 30 days of his sentence. Birch was arraigned for deserting his family and his parole was suspended. Judge Cole permitted him to go with the understanding that he would look to their welfare. Birch failed to do this and was re-arrested.

During his imprisonment Birch repudiated the interior of the jail in the new wing of the Court House.

Katherine McElroy was adjudged guilty by Judge Cole of stealing the purse of Mrs. Emma Miller while they both were in the County Jail. Mrs. Miller's purse was found in a yard near the McElroy woman's room by the police. Ten dollars was removed.

Judge Cole placed under probation for one year and to pay 30 cents per week into the County coffers.

Admitted Phillips, of Edwood, subpoenaed, admitted his guilt before Judge Cole upon the charge of committing a serious assault upon 15-year-old girl of that place. The court placed Phillips under parole for a term of three years and to pay \$200 weekly during that time.

John Brown, a 45-year-old colored man, was arraigned for striking a constable, Brown said, drove him to the dead. Judge Cole sent him to the State Reformatory where there is no danger of his driving him to court again.

The old custom of keeping prisoners in the jail awaiting trial July sessions has been improved upon materially under the most recent methods which Judge Charles L. Cole has adopted. Who ever possible, arrangements are made for a special session and many prisoners are saved the long wait in jail pending the trial.

The present plan is to have the Grand Jury. This has materially reduced the jail population. The County Jail is now a privilege in giving suspended sentences on parole whenever the case will justify.

A new feature of the jail has been the transportation of one of the witnesses from the jail to the courtroom. This is a new feature and every prisoner must wash his own clothing, including his bedding, regularly once a week. The jail is cleaned daily by a sanitary force, giving to the inmates a clean and comfortable environment. The County of prompt adjustment of so many cases, the problem of employing prisoners in the county jail is partially eliminated.

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## CHILD LABOR REGULATIONS ARE NOW IN FULL FORCE
