DROWNED IN LAKE LENAPE.

Community Shocked by Young Lady's Tragic Death. While in bathing with two companions in Lake Lenape Thursday afternoon last, Miss

Honora O'Grady, eighteen years of age, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Michael O'Grady, former residents but now residing in New York Ulty, met a tragio death in the waters of the lake. The afternoon had been sultry and the young woman decided to bathe in the lake in the mid-afternoon as had been her custom, She waded out until the water was up to her shoulders with the intention of attempting to swim ashare, when she suddenly disappeared as though she had stepped off into deep water, her hands showing above water a few seconds and then disappearing altogether. Her companions immediately cried for help and in a few moments a dozen men and boys were in the water searching for her, while in a short time a large number of people gathered on the bank. It was nearly a half-hour, however, before her body was discovered by Harry Smallwood and brought ashore. Dr. H. C. James soon arrived and everything possible was done to revive her, but to no avail.

Nothing in recent years has so shocked the community as the tragedy of the young woman's untimely death. She was known and loved by a large circle of friends, to whom the news of her sudden death was almost unbelieveable. She was apparently in the best of health and just before going into the lake last May and asked the members if was in bigh spirits. She had recently become engaged to Mr. James Turp, of this place, and their marriage was to have taken place before iled a special session to begin July 18. Miss O'Grady was born at Norwalk, Conn. residing first at Estelville and latter moving to this place. Recently she took the leading role in a drama given by the band and she was active in social happenings. Her parents were immediately notified of the accident and at their request the body was prepared for burni here and taken yesterday afternoon on the 5,15 express to New York, where services will be held. NEW LAWS IN EFFECT

Drinking Cup Abolished, Employers' Liability Regulated, Poor Made Self-Supporting and Other Innovations.

Laws passed by the last Legislature no specified as going into effect immediately or at a later date, including an important em ployers' liability statute, went into effect July under the constitution. The employers liability act is the most important. The Stand ard Oil Company has announced that it will contest the constitutionality of the law under the first case arising in its business in the State. The Singer Bewing Machine Company will also take similar action.

Other acts that went into effect Tuesday were: The new poor laws under which the poor are to be made self-supporting; measure reducing to 11 per cent, from 12 per cent, solids required in standard milk; the abolition of the common drinking cup to prevent the spread of disease; the reapportionment of Assembly nien in countles under which Burlington, Cumberland and Monmouth lose one Assemblyman each and Atlantic, Bergen and Essex gain one each, sixty being the whole number apportioned among the twenty-one counties of the State; making it a misdemeanor for either husband or wife to desert his or her family; creating pension funds for police outside of first-class dities; abolishing the office of registhe end of the year, Mr. Turp recently secured that of deeds in counties of less than 140,000 inhabitants; enlarging to five the commission for ameliorating the condition of the blind; providing for sewers to be built upon petition of property owners; making more drastic and came here four years ago with her parents, regulations for factory fire escapes; requiring justices of the peace to use seals,

Increased Bridge and Road A propriations—Paving Bonds to be Issued-No Action on Projected Boulevard.

At the meeting of the Board of Freeholders held in Memorial Hall, Atlantic City, Wednes day last, Freeholder John D. Carver, of Elwood, brought before the Board a project for providing lighted signs along, the County roads, at intersections with other highways and at corners. The idea met with the favor of many members but as it would entail considerable expense in wiring for the lights no definite action action was taken. The Albany Avenue bridge on the Boulevard was reported out of commission and the Bridge Committee was authorized to have immediate repairs made, as oatmen are unable to get through the draw. Several bridges on the County road will be done away with by placing a drain pipe under the road and filling it in, as the stream

over which these bridges were built have become small and in some instances have almost dried up. Blate Road Commissioner Stephens announced that plans for the building of Main Road, near Hammonion, and for in following: East side of Tennessee Ave. 250 ft. the improvement of over a mile that has been added to the road, were approved and bids will be advertised for and opened at the next meeting. Bills to the amount of \$14,700 for bridge contracts were ordered paid and also general expenses of \$11,560. Bonds to the amount of \$100,000 for the im-

provement of the Shore Road were authorized to be issued, to bear five per cent, interest, The burden of the expense of the work will fall, not on the County, but on the State and the trolley company.
