The South Jersey Farmers' Exchange, located at Woodstown, is an organization for the mutual benefit of the farmers in the surrounding district.

Establishment of such an exchange in Atlantic County is advocated by Demostriator Douglas, who, together with members of the Salem County Agricultural Association, held a conference Thursday last at Woodstown.

To anyone interested in the agricultural development of Atlantic County a trip through the farming districts of Salem County is one well worth while.

WAR SAVED COTTON MILLS FROM FATE OF WOOL INDUSTRY

WEAVERS HOPE FOR RENEWAL OF PROTECTION BEFORE IT ENDS

FOREIGN CHEAP LABOR HAS BEEN THE MAIN CAUSE OF THE DECLINE OF THE COTTON MILL INDUSTRY.

Local Mill Running Full Time Regular Wages Only Because Europe's Carnage—Tariff Must Be Rebuilt To Industrial Safety.

"If the European war had not been the cotton mill in your view would have been closed to-day and the people would be facing another winter such as they had last.

Landings should consider the fact that apply to their daily business when they make up their minds.

"That the local mill is running and giving every employe regular wages is the more remarkable when we consider the situation in the cotton mill industry in this country is taken into consideration.

What the situation really was had not the war occurred can be seen by hearing the experience of the mill through the last industrial panic.

Breaking out of the war, the shipments of cotton goods to the mills of the world as well as the mills of this country have been cut off.

The war is all that saved the mills from sharing the same fate as the wool mills in the Democratic States.

These are indicated in the statement of L. Marlin, Secretary of the Association of Wool Manufacturers.

Out of the larger class of mills, 38,118 in all, 25,582 were in operation, and 12,536, or 32.6 per cent, were closed.

Of the 38,118 woolen spinning spindles, 28,582 were engaged on foreign orders; only 9,536 were engaged on domestic orders.

It will be seen that the business of the woolen mill is helping out to the extent of work for less than a year ago.

Woolen looms, including the carpet looms, the other looms suffering from the demand for goods.

Commenting on the cotton and woolen mills, Mr. Marlin says:

"The action of England in the tariff on cotton yarns is a big part of all spinners in this country.

First move since the war began is the benefit to the textile industry, together the bid is put on the business of this country.

We have plenty of supply our weavers with every thread to the finest threads, and while they have not been so good enough to supply more or less of the time since the tariff gave foreign spinners an opportunity to enter this market.

Let us hope the embargo will not be lifted until the voters have an opportunity to vote on the tariff. Then we can see if the American labor will be given a chance and there will be no imports of foreign yarn.

In an anonymous communication, a Western newspaper printed the following opinion of the situation:

"How many of our people think that the woolen mill industry is in a better situation in this country to-day than it was in 1914? If it was not for the war, the woolen mill industry would have been a total failure.

As soon as it is over and the war is settled down to rehabilitate their industries, it will be only a question of time until they will again be engaged in competition with our highest quality woolen goods.

Last July the bonded warehouse of New York and the Atlantic seaboard were filled with all sorts of imported goods which could have been made in this country.

These goods were made at a loss, made cheaper abroad and sent here in bonded ships, and were the cause of the ruin of our woolen factories and mills.

"If that is not the case, the manufacturer would have been the manufacturer, the American."
