DOUBLASS ADVOCATES FARMERS' EXCHANGE FOR ATLANTIC COUNTY

GREAT POSSIBILITIES FOR AGRICULTURAL DEVEL-OPMENT HERE

DUPLICATE SALEM'S SUCCESS

Buying And Selling Together Big Factor In Making Money For Soil Tillers-Woodstown Striking Example of Civic Development Fostered By Farming.

That the future development of May's Landing will come largely through the growth of well as co farming in the surrounding district is the belief of Farm Demonstrator Elwood Douglass who sees great possibilities in the agricultural resources of Atlantic County and looks forward to a great increase in the number of proline rms in the next ten years.

Woodstown, Salem County, with a population of only 1,700, affords a striking example of what May's Landing would be, with the surrounding farm tand under profitable cultivation. Woulstown has two banks and the value of its taxable property is \$1,303,128. Its main streets are payed, also the sidewalks. The South Jersey Farmers' Exchange, lo cated at Woodstown, an organization for the mutual benefit of the farmers in the surrounding district, did business during the past year aggregating \$100,000. This exchange buys the farmers' seeds, fertilizers and other supplies and disposes of their produce.

Establishment of such an exchange in Athtie County is advocated by Demonstrator Douglass, who, together with members of the air of the Atlantic County Vocational Schools, held a conference Thursday last at Woodstown with the officials of the exchange at that place. The success of the farmers in the vicinity of Woodstown is largely due to their organization, which secures supplies for them at wholesale prices and disposes of their crops in such a manner that the farmer gets the biggest part of the profit.

To anyone interested in the agricultural development of Atlantic County a trip through the farming districts of Salem County is one well worth while. By way of Newfield, a good road bears West to Elmer and thence to Woodstown, the latter place being 88 miles by this route from May's Landing. All along the way, may for some brief but picture of woodland, farm after farm delights the eye, with splendid crops of sweet and white potatoes, corn and grain, tomatoes and other vogetables. These farms are invariably clean and prosperous looking, with ample barns, and herds of cows at pastons are frequently seen. May's Landing was a growing municipality, most of this district had never been touched with the plow and it is only in the last quarter century that ft has been brought into prominance as one of the most proline farming sec-That Atlantic County can be developed in

the same manner as Salem County has is the belief of agriculturists, with changes, of courie, in the character of crops to correspond to the soil. Salem County farmers have learned what not to plant, which is a big lesson. They plant only those crops which are peculiarly to get the soil in condition instead of looking for big dividends in a year or so, they will meet with the same success.

IRRIGATION PROFITABLE But Farmers Should Observe Caution Installing Plants.

Observations made by members of the New Jersey Experiment Station show that an exraordinary interest has been aroused in the State in the irrigation of fruit and truck crops Some rather striking thatances of inc rop yields and profits have been noted by the Experiment Station authorities and it is hoped in the near future to have some material which will be of more than ordinary interes to those interested in irrigation operations.

The season of 1914 furnished some unusus o minarishes in the matter of increased yields and profits. It is not the desire of the Statio templating the installation of an irrigation system. While some growers have made reand have doubled or even tripled their yields. it is to be observed that not all growers would be able to succeed in this way.
