### HOW RESIDENTS CAN HELP GET RID OF MOSQUITOES

County Extermination Board Has Six Suggestions.

Specific information as to how the resident of Atlantic County may assist in the extermintion of the mosquito is given in a circular ssued by the County Mosquito Extermination Commission, which is being distributed as a reliminary move in a campaign of anti-moquito education. The bulletin is intended to more householders as to what they can do individually to get rid of the mosquito perf Six directions are given, as follows:

"First-Get rid of all standing water on you property by ditching it away or filling in. 'Second-See that there are no tin cans broken dishes, bottles, palis, rain barrels of anything on your premises or in your buck yards in which water may collect. "Thirds See that there are no wash tubs or

palls in your basement, or anything that will iold water. "Fourth-See that there is no stagnant vater in your basement or elevator shaft, so that your house will not be full of mosquitoes. " Fifth-Bee that your garbage can is covered

and that your rain barrel is screened. "Bixth-If there ds any stagment water anywhere in your neighborhood which cannot be drained sprinkle crude oil or kerosene over it County has riready been put through the provery ten days. One cup of oil is sufficient for liteen samere feet of surface.

"Those methods will absolutely prevent the breeding of mosquitoes on your premises, will ! hereby increase the real estate value of your roperty and rid you of this annoving and inngerous pest. The house mosquito is easily controlled if you will do your part and look after your own premises."

General E. Burd Grubb, the opponent of Congressman John J. Cardner in the famous campaign of 1908, former United States Minis ter to Spain, and for the past, two years Superintendent of the New Jersey Home for Disabled Boldiers at Kearney, died shortly before oon Monday last at St. Michael's Hospital, Newark, N. J. General Grubb had been in the hospital for

three weeks, and recently underwent an operation for a cataract. He recovered from the operation, but later contracted pneumonia. #### FIRE LINE LAW VOID. Court's Decision Will Injure Forest Protection.

The recent decision of the New Jersey Court of Errors declared unconstitutional the law stablishing forest fire lines on private prop-Gaskill, State Forester, as a severe blow to forest presurvation in this State. Forester Claskill says that 10 per cent, of all

the forest fires in the past originated in place where no forest fire lines were established. The law declared void provided for the establishment of fire lines along railroad property One of these lines was placed on private prop rty, the owner of the land attacking the act The Court declared the act void because i resulted in the taking of private property without compensation. The State forester mays that the forests must be protected, and he sees no way of doing it than by saking for legisintion that will be far more burdensome than the law just upset.
