# BURNS BEFORE JURY TRUE BILLS IMPOUNDED

FAMOUS SLEUTH TESTIFIES IN GRAFT CASES.

Presentment Rumored To Contain Bills Against Beachfront Cafes— Defendants Have To Be In Court Wednesday Next To Plead.

Burns, the famous sleuth, before the Grand Jury, and the Impounding of a presentment of truebills handed in by that body, were the features of last Wednesday's session, which was held in the mala room of the Court House. Burns, it is said, builined to the jury the nature and extent of the testimony he and his operatives are to present. When the bills were returned Judge Higbee, after looking them over, remarked that he at the usual hour, eight o'clock, in the lodge knew of no reason why they should be impounded and sent for Prosecutor C. L. Goldenberg to have his opinion.

"The only reason in law for impounding bills," remarked the court, "Is to prevent those indicted from escaping before they are placed under bail. I don't think there is any doubt that those indicted here will make any attempt to go away. What is your opinion, Prose

"I will leave it up to the Grand Jury," said the intter.

The foreman of the Grand Jury then arose and said that the jury had decided to return the bills to-day, but would prefer that they be impounded, but he did not assign any reason

"I will accede to your wishes, gentlemen," said the Court, "but they will be impounded until next Wednesday only, and the Prosecutor will notify those indicted to be here at that time to plend and enter ball,"
