CREMATORIAL CASE IN HANDS OF JURY AFTER HARD LEGAL BATTLE

"COFFEE ODOR" BONE OF CONTENTION BEFORE JUDGE COLE

PROMINENT RESIDENTS TESTIFY

Some Asserted Peculiar Incense Is Very Objectionable While Others Do Not Find It So—Defense Wanted Jury To Visit Plant And Use Their Own Olfactory Organs To Determine Problem.

Isa "coffeehouse" objectionable as to be a public nuisance? That is the question that kept heating up the attention of the court Wednesday last, when the Atlantic Products Company, the firm that operates the so-called "crematory" in the meadows north of Atlantic City, was arraigned by Prosecutor Charles S. Moore before Judge C. L. Cole, on an indictment found by the May Grand Jury charging the company with maintaining a public nuisance. Half a hundred witnesses testified for the state that the odor wafted from the crematory over the gentle ocean breezes interfered with their health and happiness while a large army of witnesses on behalf of the defense asserted that they were not annoyed by the said incense. Among the witnesses, on both sides were residents and officials prominent in the Queen Resort.

The case went to the jury yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock and at the hour of going to press no verdict had been reached.

The jury selected was as follows: Rev. Thomas Hemmens, foreman, Hamilton Township; H. D. Smith, Brigantine City; W. L. Anderson and Harry Lake, Pleasantville; Edward Spence, Richard Bates, H. W. Cochran, A. S. Henningway, Atlantic City; Joe Mason, Ventnor; Henry Hoffman, Villa Vista Towne ship; George Eberle, Folsom; George Conover, Somer's Point City.

Numerous witnesses for the state seemed to hold they attributed to the so-called "crematory" on the meadows that were variously described as "nauseating," "resembling the smell of burning hair," like "burning coffee grounds," or as one man put it, "something like boiling coffee, grease and old boots, all combined."

The odors were said to have been noticed in various parts of the city, even on the Boardwalk, but on cross-examination the witnesses were unable to declare that they were not from the dumping grounds nearby or from the sewage system.

It was a picturesque case, and remarkable for the good humor prevailing, although the proceedings were keenly fought on both sides. Former Attorney-General Robert H. McFarland led the forces of the defense, comprising Charles C. Baldwin, former City Solicitor Harry Wootton, and Wayne P. Ranho of Philadelphia. Assisting the Prosecutor, was Assistant W. Elmer Brown.

Directors of the Products Company present in court were Louis Knudsen and Edward J. Boden, Atlantic City; Dr. Frank McFarland, George D. Beaton and John D. Shuler, of Philadelphia.

Frequent fits between the state's witness and former Attorney-General Robert H. McFarland marked the Thursday session and added a little spice to what was otherwise a rather wearisome proceeding for the outsiders. Judge John J. White, of the Marlborough-Bethel, and his Judge of the Court of Errors and Appeals, and Mr. McFarland engaged in several wordy "scamps" while the former was testifying about the odors and once the remarks became so heated that it was necessary for Judge Cole to call for order.

Counsel for the defense requested the court yesterday morning to allow the jury to visit the plant and vicinity and make a personal investigation, but Judge Cole refused the motion, ruling that this was unnecessary in order to determine the issue.

NOW IS THE SEASON TO GUARD AGAINST TYPHOID

Flies One Of Worst Conveyors Of Deadly Disease Germs.

During the next four months it will pay every individual and every community in the United States to adopt every safeguard against typhoid fever. This advice is given by officials of the United States public health service, who are more active than ever this season in warning people to guard themselves against typhoid during July, August, September and October, which is the season of the year when the disease is more prevalent than at any other time.

Typhoid fever is a life-threatening disease, it is caused by germs which are parasites, and which depend for their perpetuation upon multiplication in the bodies of human beings. The germs are discharged from the bodies of persons, and to cause the disease in other persons these germs must be swallowed. Unless we put into our mouths and swallow something which has been soiled or contaminated with human filth we will not have typhoid.

A house fly may carry enough typhoid germs on its legs and body to infect large quantities of foods and beverages, and so cause a large number of persons to be exposed to typhoid infection. Water, clean, sparkling and free from objectionable taste and odor, may contain them. Milk, apparently clean and sweet and rich, may be teeming with typhoid germs.

Individuals can safeguard themselves against typhoid by seeing that the houses in which they live are screened against flies, that their food is protected against contamination, and by assuring themselves that the water and milk which they drink come from sources that are free from typhoid infection.

Runaway Causes Excitement.

A runaway on Main Street caused considerable excitement Thursday morning when the horse attached to Fred Smallwood's milk wagon became frightened while standing near the Main Station and dashed down the road. Near Baker's corner he met a team driven by Howard Abbott which dashed off the road into a fence. Dodging other wagons and automobiles, the frightened animal turned into Pomerleau's livery stables and made for the barn. He dashed through an open door, but the wagon wouldn't pass and tore loose at the door, smashing the stable.

THOMAS C. BARRETT DEAD AFTER LONG SUFFERING

Passed Away Yesterday At Millville At Home Of His Brother.

After several months suffering from Bright's disease, the last two of which he has been confined to the home of his brother, William Barrett, at Millville, whether he went in search of health, Thomas C. Barrett, warden of the Atlantic County Jail, passed away yesterday shortly after twelve o'clock. He was forty-eight years of age.

Barrett has been a lifelong resident of May's Landing and vicinity and his death is a great shock to his large circle of friends, to whom, however, the fitting did not come as a surprise as his condition has been steadily growing weaker for the last two months. Up until the time two years ago when he was first taken with the disease, that ended yesterday in his death, he was an unusually vigorous, healthy man and hardly knew a day's illness.

For several years Mr. Barrett was engaged in her butcher business, and during the term of ex-sheriff Smith E. Johnson accepted a position in the County Jail. Later he was made warden and for several years has been an efficient, trusted official. His close confinement to his duties, of which he was in active charge day and night, contributed largely to his illness. During the rest of the latter he stuck to his post, only relinquishing it two months ago when he could no longer stand up against his progress.

Announcement of the funeral arrangements will be made today by the family. Interment will be in charge of Unity Lodge No. 96, F. & A. M., of which he was a member.
