STATE FORESTER GASKILL'S

SUGGESTION RECEIVED WITH GREAT FAVOR Township Committee Considers Project and Decides To Take

Action Co-operative with County,

To Preseve Grand Shade Trees

of the County Capital. State Forester Alfred Gaskill'swiggestion for the preservation of the grand old trees of May's Landing was lavorably received Friday evening of last week by the members of the Townmonthly meeting at that time. The matter was brought to the attention of the Committee by Chairman Harrison Wilson, with whom the State Forester had a conference when here fast week. The Committee seemed of the same opinion of the Forester, that a few hundred

dollars spent in "doctoring" the old drees and prolonging their life will be a good in vestment. Nothing can be done at present except to feed "the roots of the trees where decaying ops show lack of nutriment, but the Committee will arrange to have the trees, gone over by an expert early in the Fall, who will estimate on the work, and later when the leaves have fallen the old veterans will be subjected to a ourse of treatment that the State Forester be-Heves will lengthen their lives at least a quarter of a century beyond what they would other-wise live. Many of them are beginning to decay now in which the diseased portlops can be

moved and the decay halted. The Building Committee of the Board of Freeholders, by whose request the Forester came to May's Landing, will have the trees on the County grounds "doctored" at the same time that the trees along the avenues and in the park of the municipality are attended to, s many of the grand old trees are budly

deen ved. In addition to caring for the old trees, both the County and the Township will likely have coung trees planted, to fill vacant places where old ones have been removed and to take the place of others which cannot live many years longer. Gaskill recommends the planting of white or red oaks, which are slow to grow but last for generations. He advises the surchase of fairly good size trees, costing about ten dollars each, which in a few years time will attain quite a growth.
