MAY'S LANDING, JULY 19, 1913.

Nearly four months since the Legislature adjourned and the laws enacted have not yet been published. Yet they say "repeal of the law is no excuse." There is a serious dereliction of duty somewhere that should be remedied in a peremptory manner.

When the big wheel of life spins, where's your boy or girl? Do you know? You should. If you don't, you may have a pretty good idea when they go astray. "Mother's apron strings" are the best thing your children can be tied to until they have reached an age of discretion.

May's Landing may well feel proud of her new Post-office quarters, which are the most up-to-date of any town of this size in Jersey. They are a credit to the town, to the postmaster and to the building, Daniel F. Biele, whose enterprise made the improvement possible. Let us have many more such notable improvements.

Republicanism in Atlantic County grows more and more evident as the weeks go by and next November will witness one of the staunchest Republican rallies marching to the polls that was ever known. For many years have been buried too deep for resurrection and every Republican is rallying to the support of Grand Old Party principles and candidates, for Republicanism and prosperity go hand in hand.

If an increasing number of strangers are any indication of growth of a municipality, the large number of visitors noticed this season in and about the County Capital is a significant sign. Time was, as the old folks say, when a stranger was a real curiosity, but nowadays there are so many that they create no comment, except by way of comparison. To this end both auto and frequent train service have doubtless contributed in a large measure.

Under the direct primary act, every citizen who wishes to run for office has an equal chance and from the number of candidates who are circulating petitions this year it looks like "free-for-all" at the primary election to be held in September. This is a good thing, for it removes the odium against party stunts and gives every one an opportunity to go before his fellow citizens. Let every one have his opportunity and may the best man win, but let it be out of the primaries and all get together afterward for the success of the party ticket.

Every public official of the County Capital is paying proportionately to the tax payers and turns in annually a much greater revenue than it costs to run these departments. In view of this fact, the Building Committee of the Board of Freeholders believes it is quite fitting and proper that these offices should be equipped in an up-to-date manner, and that the employees should be given not only all possible assistance in the way of office equipment, but should be provided with comfortable quarters. To that end electric fans have been installed, awnings erected and other measures taken to keep the offices bright and airy. This is not only an incentive for better work, but is actually an aid to the health of the employees, for a hot, stuffy office is a breeding place for disease. Let us hope that the Board of Freeholders will continue to work with us and will be able to provide them with as comfortable quarters as possible.

Public sentiment is approving action. The Township Committee may take heart from the fact that the grand old oak of May's Landing, the very last of its kind in the beautiful shade trees and the mother of a hundred dollars spent in the planting of the old veterans who returned from the Civil War, is being preserved. Since the death of the old tree, many of the old trees, many of which have been badly damaged, have been planted in their place. By scientific treatment, which includes feeding, pruning, removing decayed or diseased limbs, painting old wounds made by storms, firing in ditches and other work. This work is done by experts, who devote their whole time to the task and who are in such great demand that engagements must be made months ahead of time. Scores of men are now having their shade trees cared for in this manner. Many of them would give thousands of dollars for a mere dozen of the old trees that grace the avenues and groves of May's Landing. As Forester Cassell says: "You can't dig up these grand old trees when you want them. They are the world's treasures."

Forester Cassell also pointed emphatically to the need of planting young trees now, before the old trees go. "I am convinced that the planting of oak trees," he said, "because they will have a number of years to grow before the old trees disappear and will last for generations."

Two residents realize fully what a treasure May's Landing possesses in her grand old trees. Although the time will come when they will go, it can be postponed a quarter of a century at least, and meanwhile, young trees can be growing to take their place. Let us preserve the old trees as long as possible.
