

GIRL HARBORED IN CAMDEN HERE WITH CAPTOR

ARREST ITALIAN RESIDENT FOR KEEPING THEM OVERNIGHT

SHE TRIED TO ESCAPE BY JUMP Leaped From Moving Automobile But Man Followed And Recaptured Her—Fugitives Still At Large But Detectives Expect To Nab Them.

After a chase across the State for almost a week, a Camden girl, said to have been abducted by Sam Dargis, detective in their cell here Thursday evening last, arrested Mrs. Mary Laquidara, of this place, on the charge of harboring the fugitive, Mrs. Laquidara admitted the fact she harbored overnight according to evidence secured by the officers, I. T. Doman, of the Camden Prosecutor's office and Bert J. Freeman, assigned to the case by Prosecutor Charles H. Moore, of this County.

Arrival of the Mangano girl and her alleged abductor here Wednesday evening was witnessed by Thomas Thorne, manager of the county workhouse. Thorne was on the county road in the vicinity of Laquidara's residence when a girl jumped screaming from an auto, followed by a man, who captured her. A number of Italians gathered about the pair and later they went to the residence of Laquidara.

Thorne went up to the driver of the auto and asked him what the trouble was. "I don't know," the driver replied, "all I know about it is, I was hired to bring them here. The driver did not wait but proceeded on his way. After the car started, he gave in jumping from the machine, the girl made no further outcry.

The detectives reached here Thursday afternoon and secured evidence before making the arrest. They were first placed on the trail by a young brother of Mrs. Laquidara, who told the detective a strange couple stayed at the house of his sister the night before. The detective later examined the premises and found the room occupied by the fugitives. Constable Samuel Taylor served the warrant on Mrs. Laquidara and the hearing was held before Magistrate J. A. Lambert, who held the defendant under \$500 bail for the grand jury, bond being furnished by Peter Laquidara.

So far as could be learned, yesterday the pair had not yet been captured, their destination after leaving this place being in doubt, but the detectives expect to land them in a few days. Had the girl made further outcry after leaping from the auto it is likely that the police would have arrested her, but she appeared to be walking peacefully and she saw no evidence of three being used. Suspecting the party, he reported the incident to Magistrate J. A. Lambert, who, not knowing of the alleged abduction, had no grounds for action at the time. The Magistrate is disinclined to believe the theory that the girl was held against her will, as she could have made further outcry at the time when she was being taken away. The girl, however, was working on the theory that she was forcibly captured and detained and at present of capture Dargis will likely face a very serious charge.

SHORE ROAD PAVEMENT SHOCKS AUTO VISITORS Rough Road To Travel And Submerged In Places After Storms.

Motorists are having ample cause to condemn the Shore Road these days, when in addition to the roughness of the pavement frequent showers are leading many places flooded with water, in some instances, the water is so deep that it is almost impossible to pass. The road, which was paved several years ago and over which litigation is still going on in the courts to force the trolley company to pay their share of the work, is said to be one of the worst places of payment in New Jersey and the members of the Board of Freeholders will take ample precautions to make certain the meadow boulevard, when it is paved, will be more creditable highway.

New gravel roads in the county are being built for the motorist to drive on at this stretch of pavement from Absecon to Somers' Point City. The trolley tracks run in the centre and the work is being done under the shock of the cars as they gradually break up the pavement along the rails, this being blamed for much of the trouble. The road bed itself, however, is quite uneven and very unsatisfactory for a paved road.

Contracted with this road is the experimental piece of paving laid on the Atlantic City road, which is being done by the County Commission has decided that the best method of paving is by ditch digging in a trench, and in addition to the 200 miles of ditches already dug in the county, at the expense of the State, is preparing for the digging of 100 miles more, which will virtually complete the work.

There is a very perceptible falling off of mosquitoes along the entire coast, and the various lands bodies across the doubling of property values should this section be known to the public to be free from mosquitoes.

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FARM DEMONSTRATOR'S DEPARTMENT NEWS

Value of Nitrogen For Top-Dressing—Summer Poultry Parasites—State Exhibit For Fall Fairs And Agricultural Meetings.

"Many people no doubt read an article in 'The Record' a short time ago on alfalfa, says the Farm Demonstrator. "I do not think we can say too much about the perennial plant and when it is well established it will last from four to ten years depending on the preparation of the soil and the treatment of the plant after it is sown. Maximum people think that alfalfa County soils are too light and sandy, but alfalfa is adapted to a wide range of soils, loam, sandy or clay, provided there is not a too compact and hard subsoil. Good drainage is essential to allow the surface water to escape. The alfalfa plant will not thrive where water stands a few days. A person just sowing their first piece of alfalfa must bear in mind that it is a great feeder and one of the things it needs most is lime, and also a generous supply of phosphoric acid and potash. Prof. J. E. Wing, the alfalfa king, says he has used as high as six tons of burned lime to the acre, but on our Atlantic County soils from 1 1/2 to 3 tons of ground limestone would be sufficient at least for the first two years, then it would be well to top dress with one ton per acre.

"The preparation of the soil should be just as thorough as if we were preparing it for garden vegetables, for the young plant must have the soil free from weeds. The inoculation of the soil for the first planting is very essential; it may be done with either the soil from a field that has previously grown alfalfa successfully, or pure culture inoculation that you can buy from the seed stores in bottles. The seed should be sown about the 20th of August and even though it might make a fine growth before Winter it should be left to protect the roots.

"Just a word to the farmers who are thinking of starting alfalfa for the first time. Start right. It pays. We only have a few acres that are grown successfully in the county. Let us try to increase the acreage to at least fifty and probably one hundred acres if we can."

The New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station, in its recommendations for early Spring applications of commercial fertilizers, has special emphasis upon the value of nitrogen. A formula which has given good results in tests conducted by the Station is composed of 100 pounds nitrate of soda, 150 pounds acid phosphate and 50 pounds muriate of potash. The scarcity of potash at the present time leads the Station authorities to call attention to the fact that on the heavier soils, especially the above mixture may be varied with good results by increasing the amount of nitrate of soda and decreasing the amount of potash.

During the hot summer days, body lice and red mites are particularly prevalent in the poultry yard. These parasites, along with one or two less important ones, cause serious losses to poultry keepers. Body lice are parasites which exist in large numbers on the body of the birds infested, biting at the base of the feathers and causing irritation. The application of reliable body powder is necessary during the summer season, applications being made three times, about two weeks apart if the infestation is apparently heavy. Any lice powder is efficient, if it is very finely ground.

A good reliable and economical home-made lice powder can be prepared as follows: Mix 3 parts gasoline and 1 part crude carbolic acid together in a dish pan, and into this stir approximately 4 parts plaster of paris. Mix until all the powder comes into contact with the liquid. Rub through a screen to break the lumps. Spread out on a table for twenty-four hours to dry. Never mix this in a room in which there is an open flame. Dust into the plumage thoroughly.

Red mites are blood-sucking insects which live on the body of the bird at night, seeking shelter in the cracks and crevices of the roosts and dropping blood during the day. The application of pure kerosene to such cracks and crevices will rid the house of an infestation of red mites.

The Extension Department of the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station is for Fall Farm and Agricultural Meetings. The exhibit now consisting of the various lines of work conducted by all departments of the Agricultural College. It consists of charts, models, samples, etc. The exhibit can be sent to Farms with a man in charge upon application at once to the Extension Department. The only cost is expressage.

Even though sweet clover is in its experimental stage, Demonstrator Douglas believes it would be a profitable crop for Atlantic County soils, and well worth a trial. The following extracts were taken from Bulletins and Farmers' Magazines: It will grow in almost any soil or climate, doing well where the rain fall is light, and will stand an excessive amount of moisture. It is an excellent crop to use in preparing the soil for alfalfa. It makes a fine feeder for livestock if cut early and often. It needs very little fertilizer, but does better where there is some humus and at least one ton of lime applied per acre. Most of the sowing is done in May and June, but it does very good sown the first of August. Atlantic County farmers are urged to try this clover. If you don't care for it after a year or two turn it under and sow alfalfa. No man was ever disappointed with alfalfa if he started it in the proper way.

In at least 89 of our 48 United States there are peach interests of commercial importance according to a new Farmers' Bulletin (No. 83) of the Department of "Growing Peaches." This bulletin is the first of three on the general subject of peach growing, which will treat of fundamental orchard operations. The questions of site, propagation, planting, tillage and soil fertility are treated in the first bulletin now being issued.

An educational crusade against the house fly in which every proper means of publicity should be employed is urged by the Department of Agriculture. In a new Farmers' Bulletin, No. 679, it is stated that the danger from the house fly must be brought more forcibly home to the people before health officers can do effective work. By the expenditure of sufficient pains, any one individual may prevent the breeding of his pest, but he will not rid him of the danger from flies if his neighbors are careless.

"The Record" has been designated the official farm newspaper by the County Farm Demonstrator and it will contain live farm news every week. Items of interest from farmers in every section of the county will be welcomed. Grange notices will be published, also notices of other agricultural meetings, free of charge.

U. S. APPEALS COURT VINDICATES KUEHNLE CONVICTION UNJUST

COMMODORE HAD NO INTEREST IN WATER MAIN WORK

WARREN BROS. WIN DECISION

Judge Woolley Finds Contract Was Let To Lockwood And United Paving Company Did Not Participate—Atlantic City Must Pay \$72,876.84.

By the decision of Judge Victor B. Woolley, in the United States Circuit Court of Appeals, affirming verdicts against Atlantic City for the water main extra contract, the company is completely vindicated of having any interest in the work, on which charge he was indicted by the grand jury and convicted by a specially-drawn petit jury. The court's decision affirms the defense offered by Mr. Kuehnle at the trial, that he did not have any interest in the concern to which he helped award the contract as Water Commissioner.

Judge Woolley's decision affirmed verdicts secured against Atlantic City by the Warren Brothers Company for \$99,744.65 and Frank R. Lockwood and William L. Cherry for \$12,123. Ex-Judge Clarence L. Cole and City Solicitor Theodore Shimp represented the city in the appeal.

The right of the Warren Brothers to recover depended on whether Lockwood was the contractor, or the United Paving Company, in which Mr. Kuehnle was said to hold an interest. Both the Supreme Court and the U. S. Court of Appeals having decided Lockwood, and not the company, was the contractor, the city will be obliged to pay Warren Brothers, to whom the payment was assigned by Cherry, who held an assignment from Lockwood, the original contractor. The United Paving Company had at no time any interest in the work. This was the contention of Mr. Kuehnle at the time of his trial and the verdict and affirmation constitute a complete exoneration for him.

COURT REFUSES TO HALT TUBERCULOSIS HOSPITAL Northfield Residents Lose Fight To Relocate Institution. Vice-Chancellor Learning has denied a bill for the injunction sought by Northfield City to restrain the county from erecting a tubercular hospital on the county site at Northfield. The injunction was sought by the City of Northfield and the Board of Health, who are holders of the property; J. Masten & Son, builders of the hospital, were also named defendants in the issue.

The hospital for tuberculars, which the County Board is required to build according to law, is now under course. The foundation have been laid and within a short time the main floor will be finished. The work was discontinued during the period of litigation. The petitioners in the case are requesting an injunction should issue. They held that some of the property holders lived on the other side of Dolphin Road, the road on which the hospital was to be erected, that such a hospital would materially interfere with the comfort and enjoyment of the homes of people who reside at Northfield, and that was reasonable to suppose a hospital for a communicable disease would excite fear in the minds of the residents and visitors of Northfield, and that property values there would very seriously diminish.

In his opinion denying the injunction the Vice-Chancellor says in part: "The complainant City of Northfield is, sparsely settled municipality, its territory consisting chiefly of farms and woodland; in fact the municipality is about two miles square and contains a population of 966 according to the census of 1910; since that time the population has increased substantially. It does not justify a conclusion that any danger to health exists or can be reasonably apprehended from the operation of this institution, providing it is properly operated. In this view the only possible ground for relief is the claim that the establishing of the hospital is operative to materially reduce the market value of the adjacent real estate. That claim, standing alone, cannot justify the relief here sought."

Promise To Start Work. In a letter received Tuesday by the local Freeholders from the County Engineer, the latter states that work will be started at an early date on the new drain at Baker's corner. Material for the drain has been on the ground for several weeks and as every rain storm causes the existing to become flooded it is hoped that the improvement will be made promptly.
