Leaped From Moving Automobile But Man Followed And Recaptured Her-Fugitives Still At Large But Detectives Expect To Nab Them.

Arrival of the Mangano girl and her alleged abductor here Wednesday evening was witnessed by Thomas Thorpe, manager of the out glass works. Thorpe was on the county road in the vicinity of Laquidare's residence when a girl jumped screaming from an auto, followed by a man, who captured her. A number of Italians gathered about the pair and later they went to the residence of Laquidare.

Thorpe went up to the driver of the auto and asked him what the trouble was, "I don't know, "the driver replied, "all I know about them is, I was bired to bring them here," The driver did not wait but proceeded on his way. After the one scream she gave in jumping from the machine, the girl made no further

The detectives reached here Thursday afternoon and secured evidence before making the arrest. They were first placed on the trail by a young brother of Mrs. Laquidare, who told the etectives a strange couple stayed at the house of his sister the night before. The detectives later examined the premises and found the room occupied by the fugitives. Constable Samuel Taylor served the warrant on Mrs. Laquidare and the hearing was held before Magistrate J. A. Lambert, who held the de-fendant under \$500 bail for the grand jury, wond being furnished by Peter Lequidare.

So far in could be learned preterday the pair

had not yet been captured, their destination after leaving this place being in doubt but the detectives expect to land them in a few days. Had the girl made further outery after leap ing from the auto it is likely that Thorpe would have interfered, but she appeared to be walking peaceably and he naw no evidence of force being used. Suspecting the party, he re-ported the incident to Milgistrate J. A. Lambert, who, not knowing of the alleged abduc tion, had no grounds for action at the time. Value of Nitrogen For Top-Dressing-Summer Poultry Parasites -State Exhibit For Fall Fairs And Agricultural Meetings.

"Many people no doubt read an article in The Record's short time ago on alfalfa, says the Farm Demonstrator. "I do not think we can say too much about the perennial plant and when it is well established it will last from tour to ten years depending on the preparation of the soil and the treatment of the plant after it is once started. Many people think Atlantic County soils are too light and sandy, but alfalfa is adapted to a wide range of soils, oam, sandy or clay, provided there is not a too and L. M. Red inites are blood-sucking insects which live on the body of the bird at night, seeking shelter in the cracks and crevices of the roosts and dropping boards during the day. The application of pure kerosene to such cracks and crevices will rid the house of an infestation of red mites.

The Extension Department of the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station is now a work making up an exhibit, for the Fall Fairs and Agricultural Moetings. The exhibit will show something of the various lines of work conducted by all departments of the Agricul tural College. Even though sweet clover is in its experimental stage, Demonstrator Douglass believes it would be a profitable crop for Atlantic County soils, and well worth a trial. The following extracts were taken from Bulletins and Farmers' Magazines: It will grow in almost any soil or climate, doing well where the rain fall is light, and will also stand an excessive amount of moisture. It is an excellent crop to use in preparing the soil for alfalfa. It makes a fine feed for livestock if cut early and often. It needs very little fertilizer, but does better where there is some humus and at least one ton of lime applied per acre. Most of the sowing is done in May and June, but it does very good sown the first of August. Atlantic County farmers are urged to try this clover. If you don't care for it after a year or two turn it under and sow alfalfa. No man was ever disappointed with alfalfa if he started it in the

In at least 39 of our 48 United States there are peach interests of commercial importance socording to a new Farmers' Bulletin (No. 631) o the Department, on "Growing Peachea" This bulletin is the first of three on the general subject of peach growing, which will treat of fundamental orchard operations. The questions of site, propagation, planting, tiliage and soil fertility are treated in the first buildin now being imped.

An educational crusade against the house fly in which every proper means of publicity should be employed is urged by the Department of Agriculture. In a new Farmers' Bulletin, No. 679, it is stated that the danger from the house fly must be brought more for cibly home to the people before health officers can do effective work. By the expenditure of sufficient pains, any one individual may prevent flies breeding on his premises, but this will not rid him of the danger from files if his neighbors are careless.

Judge Woolley's decision affirmed verdicts secured against Atlantic City by the Warren Brothers Company for \$69,734.45 and Frank S. Lockwood and William I. Cherry for \$3,162.38. Ex-Judge Clarence L. Cole and City Solicitor Theodore Shimpf represented the city in the

The right of the Warren Brothers to recover depended on whether Lockwood was the contractor, or the United Paving Commany, in which Mr. Kuehnle was said to hold an Interest. Both the Supreme Court and the U.S. Court of Appeals having decided Lockwood. and not the company, was the contractor, the city will be obliged to pay Warren Brothers, to whom the payment was sesigned by Cherry, who held an assignment from Lockwood, the original contractor. The United Paving Compuny had at no time any interest in the work. This was the contention of Mr. Kuchnic at the time of his trial and the verdict and affirmation constitute a complete exoneration for him.
