Angered by his former sweetheart's prese with another young man, Nicholas Green, an Italian youth of this place, aged twenty-one, is said to have ambushed Mary Rose DeMattee and her escort, Nicholas Guinta, Wednesday night last at the Watering Place bridge on the Egg Harbor road and as they sped by on a motorcycle fired five shots at them, one taking effect in Miss DeMatten's right foot and an other brushing close to Guinta's face.

Two weeks ago Green had an altereation with Miss DeMattoo and at that time threatened to kill her and any other man he caught her out with. Miss DeMutteo reported this to Magistrate J. A. Lambert, who summoned Green and on his promise to let the girl alone.

Wednesday night Miss DeMattee rode to Egg Harbor City with Guinta on his motor cycle and it was on their return, about eleven o'clock, that a man she identified as Green Jumped out into the road and calling on them to stop, fired point-blank at them. Instead of g, Guinta speeded up his machine and Green fired after them, the last bullet striking and painfully wounding Miss DeMatteo's foot. She kept her seat and Guinta drove here to her boarding place, where Dr. H. C. James

# TO UPTOWN CROSSING ITEMS OF INTEREST MAY EXTEND PAVING Also Build Link From Downstown

An extension will likely be made to the plans for paving Main Street and eliminating the Bugar Hill rathroad crossings, which are now in the hands of the State Road Depart. ment. The paving will likely be extended all the way to the Main Station crossing and a connecting link be built from the Tuckalice road, South of the railroad, to the Downstown roud, so the present Downstown grade crossing

Warrenite is the form of paving used on the Meadow Boulevard and has stood up well under severe tests It is dark in color, clastic and makes a comparatively quiet, fine appearing highway. The improvement will be pushed through as soon as the State has funds to devote to the purpose.

**AGRICULTURE SUGGESTIONS** AND RECENT RURAL HAPPENINGS

Much has already been said by the Office of Farm Demonstration about the growing of nifelfa and its feeding value. These statements have recently been strengthened by Mr. Jeffers of the Walker-Gordon Farms, who spent a part of Tuesday, July 18th in going over Atlantic County visiting fields that are one year old as well as studying the different types of soil that inight be made to grow alfalfa. Mr. Jeffers' opinion is one that should be highly valued as he has made a thorough study of this wonderful crop, visiting not only nearly every state in the Union but also spending several weeks shroad.

He feels that there is just as great an opportunity for alfaits in Atlantic County as on the Walker-Gordon Farms. A few years ago was very doubtful it sifaits could be grown there. At present, Mr. Jeffers states, they have more than 550 acres in alfalfa which is doing old, be is planning to sow 250 acres, more this Fell.

The fields inspected were not the lightest solls in Atlantic County, but in August the Office of Farm Demonstration is planning to try out two or three blocks of the very lightest of woll,

Alfalfa is not a hard crop to grow; all 1 peeds is care and attention. A furmer would not think of planting onion seed, celery seed or any of the other market garden crops without first preparing the land well. Give atfalfa as much attention and the returns will be lust as great as from truck crops. Parmers who have never given this crop any thought should stop right now and consider sowing at least an acre this Fall. Look over your farm and pick out a block that is at least three feet above water level and well drained. Good crops to precede alfalfa are onion sets, early potatoes early truck crops. This land does not need plowing, provided it is free from weeds. All needs is a thorough discing. If the block has not been limed in the past four years and you are in doubt about the amount needed ake a small sample of soil taken from at least three places in the field about four inche leep and send to the Office of Farm Demon stration. The same will be tested, which will give you the approximate amount of lime needed to correct the acidity of your soil. After the land has been limed it should be worked well into the soll and then about three or four hundred pounds of fertilizer applied to the acre to belp the young plants get a start until they are able to take care of themselves. The seed should be sown about August 15th.

There are not 500 acres of alfalfa grown is Atlantic County. Why should not you be one to pick out a plot and get in line to help increase this screage? If any help is needed and ou write the Office of Farm Demonstration, the Demonstrator will be glad to inspect your land and give you directions on caring for this crop.

Potato growing is one of the most important industries in New Jersey. In 1915 there were 000,000 nurse in patenton peptideng 11, perus 000,00 bushels, or an average of 130 bushels per acre This crop levalued at \$97.50 per scre, or \$9,084. 000 for the entire crop. However, the industry suffers very beavy annual losses, which are due primarily to three causes: unfavorable weather, insects and diseases. The diseases caused by fungi and bacteria are the causes of the greater part of our losses. A conservative estimate of the annual losses in New Jersey pointo production due to fungus and bacterial diseases will range from 10 per cent to 25 per cent. Many of these losses could be prevented by the proper selection and treatment of seed. t by the proper treatment of the growing

crops. During the hot Summer months the greates part of the trouble experienced on poultry plants is found on the ranges where the growing stock is kept. One of the leading cause of range losses during the Summer is the overcrowding of the birds. There should be a sufficient number of colony bouves to accom date the birds. The colony bouses are used by the young birds at pight, and if they are forced to crowd together, serious results will occur Chicks need a large amount of fresh air air in order to keep growing constantly. If crowded at night they are forced to breathe the same air time after time, a condition which results in stunted growth and invites disease. Colony iouses with from 50 to 75 birds in each pro vide much better conditions than in cases where hundreds of birds are hept in a single nouse. If several emaciated, stunted birds are found on the ranges, look first to the colony houses at night. They are probably

overcrowded. The sweet potato crop in South Jersey is in very good condition in spite of the adverse weather early in the season. Since the hot weather began, the vines have grown vigor

susly and are now covering the ground. One disease seems to be quite prevalent owever, which is causing many vines to die or to become yellow and stunted. Much of this disease it stem not, sometimes spoken of as "wilt" or "veilow blight," Frequently this disease destroys the plant. In many cases, however, especially during wet weather, the diseased plant will continue to grow and pro duce a moderate yield, but the potatoes will be infected. Stem rot can be detected at any time by splitting the stem of the vines near the ground. A brown coloration indicates the ence of the disease. Farm demonstrators are urging the farmers to select their sweet ed for the following year at digging time. By splitting the stems of the most destrable hills, seed clear of infection can be obtained. Such a practice should reduce the

however, familiarize the general public with its workings. As a result of the probation system there has been a marked reduction in the number of inmates in the County Jail. instead of the gradual increase that obtained for several years prior to 1914, when the system was definitely adopted. Before that it had been in operation but not so extensively as at present. The number of prisoners in the County Jail at this time runs from thirty to forty, as against sixty to seventy two years ago and at times


