PROBE INTO ASSESSMENTS

State Commission Will Recommend Revision of Statute Relating To Taxation — True Valuation Is Advocated:

Public hearings were held Monday morning hist at the Court House and Monday afternoon in Atlantic City by the State Tax Commission which is investigating methods of assessmen in all parts of the State and will recommend to the next Legislature a revision of the law relative to taxation. Among the changes advocated will be higher taxation of unimproved property, tax maps to keep record of every inch of land in each county, dividing counties into convenient tax districts with appoint-

ment of assessors by County Tax Board and increase of pay for the former. Assessor Harry Jenkins appeared before the Commission at the Court House and went. over tax conditions in Hamilton Township thoroughly.

"I believe a tax map would be an excellent thing for all districts," said Mr. Jenkins. There are large tracts of land in this Township which have not been assessed for years much of it worthless, however, but a great deal that could be taxed if it were surveyed and accurate records kept of all real estate

"In regard to visiting every property in the Township and making an activate estimate of Mrs. Issue Collins. its value and assessing it accordingly it is wellnigh Impossible under present conditions, There are seventy-thousand acres of land in State, larger, in fact, than the whole of Hud-

"When I became Assessor five years ago. the valuation placed on Township property was \$100,000 and now it is about \$1,000,000. The increase in valuation this year will be about \$150,000, so I think Hamilton Township is paying its full share of taxes, when it is taken into asideration that the property has been little


