Examination of registrants in Athentic County, outside of Atlantic City, will begin Monday House, before the Exemption noard, consisting of Sheriff Joseph R. Barilett, County Clerk E. A. Parker and Dr. H. C. James. The examinations will be made by the latter, in the presence of the other members of the Board and he will be assisted by Dr. Thed. H. Boysen, of Egg Har bor City.

Eighty registrants have been called for Monday, eighty for Tuesday and others in like number for the following days. They will continue to be called until the required number, 214, has been stenred. A list of the first 428 to be called, in the order summoned, follows. The first eighty on this list will be called Monday, the second elabty Tuesday, etc: The physicians have a big day's work cu out for them but expect to complete the examluation of that number such day.

Those who appear for examination, who

have families or other reasons for claiming exemption or discharge, can file notice of their ciding when they appear for examination and will be given the proper blanks for taking affidavits to support their claim. Those who are found physically disabled will be given certificates to that effect by the Board.

Allens who are summoned may claim exemption by reason of not being subjects of this country and their examination may be postponed by the Board, though this is not ertain to be done. Everyone must appear for examination on the day specified on the notice, if any do not, they will be set down as sligible for service and rounded up by the secret service. War demands individual sacrifice to the mmon cause. No people ever approached war with a calmer appreclation of that sacrifice themselves to be classified for service in the place to which it shall best serve the common goodsto call them.' This calm determination could not exist were it not for the couldence of the Nation in its institutions. In this public confidence is found the very spirit of the Selective Service Law. The most sucred rights of country, home and family are intrusted for adjudication to local citizens and officials, nominated by State governors and appointed by the President. The most equitable rules that could be devised have been prescribed for guidance, and the administration of these rules and the acrifice that is offered by your neighbors is intrusted to your hands.

"From every one is demanded a sacrifice But there is one thought to be kent always in your mind. The selected man offers his life. There is no greater giving than this; and that thought should guide you always. There may be a few who will urge upon you claims for exemption or discharge that, whatever may be your inclinations of sympathy or affection, you will know ought not to be granted. It will strengthen you to remember that for every exemption or discharge that is made for individual convenience, or to escape personal loss of money or property, or for favor or affection, some other man whose time would not otherwise have come, must incur the risk of losing his life.

There can be no room for healtation in such No one has a vested right, by himself or

by attorney, to urge, by argument or pleading; his individual case upon you. You should rigidly exclude this. Ordinarily you should act on the affidavits. If you desire more information you may proceed to get it. If you doubt the affidavits you may interrogate othe persona. If you desire more proof you may get it. But no claimant has a right to submi other proof than that called for by regulations or than that you may call for.

"The Nation needs men and needs them quickly. The hours will then be long and the work absorbing. The duty is always to take and never to give, and human/nature is such there will be little praise and some blame. The sacrifice of many of those whose cases are to be decided is no greater than that of the men who are to decide them; and your only reward must be the knowledge that, at great personal sacrifice, you are rendering your country an indispensable service in a matter of the utmost

Every exemption granted by the local board iii be automatically appealed to the District Board and the evidence reviewed there, so the very plain and convincing. Dependencies will the cause of the greatest number of discharges and where the man called has others solely dependent upon him for support the government, at this time, will excuse him; but no one will be allowed to hide behind pretended dependents.

The best remedy for cubbage worms and caterpiliars is the use of arsenical poisons such as Paris green and arsenate of lead, applied as a spray or as a dust, in much the same way as poisons are used on potatoes to control potato bugs. Greatest success in the control of cab bage worms is had only, by applying the poisons before the heads begin to develop. At this time the poison is accessible to all parts of the plants and is therefore more effective. Some growers hesitate to apply polson for fear that it may cause injury to people who eat the cabbage. This idea is absolutely unfounded according to all scientific investigation.

NEW SIGN BOARD LAW NOW EFFECTIVE IN NEW JERSEY

Gives Wide Powers To Public To Abate

Nuisance. Advertising signs nailed to trees or posted along the roads anywhere in New Jersey, without the written consent of the land owner, can be torn down by anyone, under a new State law which took effect March 27. The National Highways Protective Society is sending ou agents to tear down illegal signs and is askin the co-operation of the public for "preserving and restoring the beauty of our roadsides and preventing the injury and defacement of the

trees that line them." Citizens, says the Society, should ren ember that the highways for which they are well taxed to maintain should not be used to furnish free advertising for the business

interest of private individuals. The new law reads as follows: "Whoever paints or puts upon or in any manner affixes to any fence, structure, pole, rock or other object which is the property of another, whether within or without the limits of the highway, any words, device, trade mark, advertisement or notice which is no required by law to be posted thereon, withou first obtaining the written consent of the owner or tenant of such property, shall upon complaint of such owner, or of his lenant or any municipal or public officer, be punished by fine of not more than ten dollars. Any word device, trade-mark, advertisement or notice which has been painted, put up or affixed within the limits of a highway in violation of the provisions of this section shall be conbidered a public nuisance, and may be forth with removed or obliterated and abated by any person."
