FAVOR PAVED WALKS ALONG MAIN STREE

PUBLIC SENTIMENT FOR IM-PROVEMENT.

Project Slated For Consideration In Response to Popular Demand At To-night's Session of Township Committee.

In response to an unmistakable sentiment in Syor of maying the sidewalks of the maniels pality, the Township Committee, at its monthly meeting this evening at Library Hall, will consider the project and take action to secure some definite information so the improvement can be discussed intelligently and the proposition placed before the people. It is one of the most important civic improvements ever contemplated at the County Capital and sentiment in faver of the project has been rapidly guining ground,

Residents have had the merits of the imrovement demonstrated in the recent pave nent of the sidewalk fronting the County grounds and the difference will be more fully shown when inclement weather places the gravel walks in a muddy condition. By laving the cement walks fairly high and grading then towards the drains, walking along Main. Street would be comfortable the year 'round. It is suggested that walks be laid from the ratirond crossing at Bugar Hill to the crossing at the Main Blation, on both sides of the street with the exception of those portions where only one side is used for foot passage, with a walk to the Court House Station for the convenience of railroad passengers,

There is no busis for the ab-Bill'd report. The law referred to provides that 'no person shall kill or catch, or haveyn his or her posession, living or dead, any wild bird other than a game bird, or purchase, offer or expose for sale any such wild bird after it has been killed or caught; and no part of plumage skin or body of any bird protected by this section shall be sold or had in possesion for

"The purpose of the law undoudtedly is to prevent traffic in birds or their plumage, and thus to indirectly prohibit their use for the adornment of women's hats, Milliners and storekeepers who have in stock feathers and kins that have been placed under the ban, may have reason to fear arrest, but the wearers of hate that are adorned with forbidden plumage are in no danger."
