These plots have always nade a much poorer growth and have given much smaller yields than plots receiving nitroacid. The plots which have not received nitro-

the nitrate of soda are now dark green, there is an average twig growth of at least twelve inches, and the trees are well loaded with green fruit of large size; while the other section of the plots which have received only the potash and phosphoric seid, as in the past, have made only an inch or two of growth at the tips of the twigs. The foliage is yellow and there is very little fruit upon the trees, and it is much smaller in size than that upon the area re celving the nitrate of sods.

The question naturally arises, what is the best gram to grow for a cover grop, how much per cre and when is the best time to sow !-"To recommend the best cover crop it would be necessary to know the date a farmer wishes to sow, but I will suggest some good crops that


