COUNTY SOLONS WILL AID DEEPER HARBOR

ANNUAL APPROPRIATIONS CONSIDERED.

Freholders Order Plans Drawn For New Bridge Over South River On May's Landing-Tuckahoe Boulevard.

Plans were ordered drawn Wednesday last at the August meeting of the Board of Chosen Freeholders for a new bridge over South River on the May's Landing-Tuckahoe boulevard, as the old span is not only too narrow for a County road bridge but owing to its condition bestowed upon them. Under the direction of Capt. D. F. Vaughn, custodian of the building, considerable improvements have been made during the summer and they are in the best condition they have ever been.

Repairing the woodwork and doors of the Court House has greatly enhanced the appearance of that building and made it look more in keeping with the other County buildings, all of which have been built in recent years. One of the greatest difficulties been the maintenance of the lawns during the prevailing dry weather, but by dint of much sprinkling, early and late, Capt. Vaughn and his assistants have managed to keep it all in fair condition and in addition establish new grass in several places, particularly on the old terraced grounds in the rear of the Surrogate's Office.

The grounds will be still more beautified by the establishment of lawns in front of the Sheriff's residence, a feature which has been postponed until cement walks have been laid and a driveway constructed. Altogether the grounds are second to none in the State in point of general attractiveness.
