

Plants which bear pods showing spots, rust, wilt or mould should be eliminated. Mark shelled when they are thoroughly dry and shelled out by hand. If a large quantity of seed is to be saved, it will probably pay to pull the dried-up vines and thrash out the seed.



when treasonable talk and the expression of seditious sentiments cannot be longer passed. over lightly. Secret agents are at work here and in every mmunity, unknown even to local officials listening to comment, noting unpairiotic expressions made by men who should know better and tabulating the information they have secured for future reference and, if occasion demands, use in serious charges. Most of this kind of talk is due to just plain ignorance

and it is indeed satisfactory to note that there is less of it as the preparation for war progreenes. Those who entertain feelings against England must, for the present, suppress them England is our ally. Her navy is all that stands between us and German conquest on this side of the Atlantic. England and France must be fed and clothed and otherwise supplied by the United States, that is one of the greatest parts we can play in this struggle. Every ship load of food stuffs and other sup-

plies sent across lessens the need of American soldlers at the front. Read Ambassador Gerard's remarks on the war in another column. Fresh from Germany, he speaks with authority and full credence an be given to what he says. This is no "newspaper talk" or bearmy: it is the plain, unvarnished truth, which every American should know,

In the current Atlantic Monthly is an acount by Vernon Kellogg, an American who worked within the German lines for the relief of invaded districts. Mr. Kellogg says: "The Germans believe this war is necessary as a test of German position and claim. If Germany is beaten, it will prove that she has moved along the wrong evolutionary line and should be beaten. If she wins, it will prove that she is on the right way and that the rest of the world, at least that part which we and the allies represent, is on the wrong way and hould, for the sake of the right evolution of the human race, be stopped and put on the right way—or else be de-troyed as unfit.

"I went into Northern France and Belgium o act as a neutral, but I came out no neutral. Also I went in an ardent fiater of war, and I came out a more ardent one. I have seen that side of the horror and waste and outrage of war which is worse than the side revealed on the battle field. How I hope for the end of all war!

"But I have come out believing that that can not come until any people which has dedicated itself to the philosophy and practice of war as a means of human advancement is put into a position of impotence to include its belief at will. My conviction is that Germany is such a people, and that it can be put into this position only by the result of war itself. It knows no other argument, and it will accept


no other decision. The New York Tribune in last Sunday's making the American people realize the issue of this war is the lack of the first-hand credible evidence, which would convince them of what Germany believes and what Germans, high and low, are doing and have been doing for three years. If only the mass of Amercan people tould see what a few have seen, the nobilization of American sentiment and ser-

vice would be instant and complete. "It is a monstrous thing-this German terror that for three years has overhung all mankind. And now, when the end is in sight, when the defeat of force is at hand-now we must face the fact, see clearly the real issue, go forward to the true victory, which is not conquest of provinces, not the crushing of Germany, but the everiasting defeat of the German doctrine. While the Germans hold it, elieve it, practice it, the world frust fight, whether it be at the Marne, the Lys, or the Rhine. When the Germans renounce it in fact and not in phrase, then peace will come



A KING'S SECRET

By DONALD CHAMBERLIN

"What are you doing, Jean?" asked a soldier of his comrade in barracks in Paris.

"I am commemorating the scene we

witnessed today." He was having tattooed on his right arm in india ink a picture of a guillo-

tine with a figure lying on it. 'What are you doing now?" asked the other again.

"I am beginning to have tattooed under the picture of the guillotine the words 'Death to kings and tyrants.' "

These men had been stationed with their corps about the scaffold on which Louis XVI, had that day been beheaded. He who tattooed his arm was young and an enthusiastic revolutionist. So devoted was he to the cause of the people of France against their king that he did not suppose he would ever be a royalist. As to his being a king, that of course was absurd. He was but a French peasant and a sergeant in the ranks of the army.

But that was an age when the people of France rose to the surface. The kings and nobles passed away, and the commoners took their places. A great commander arose, and with him he pulled up many others. Among them was the soldler who had tattooed his arm. Sergeant Jean Bernadotte under Napoleon became a marshal of France and married a relative of the emperor.

During the early part of the nineteenth century Bonaparto was conquering kingdoms. He did not make republics of them. He had been a republican and had made up his mind that the government France most needed was a monarchy, with himself at its head. The people he conquered be placed under the control of kings, and these kings were usually members of his own family. Even if Napoleon did not conquer a kingdom his influence was so great that he could control its government.

The throne of Sweden became vacant, and Napoleon nominated-whom? The man who had stood guard over his king when he was executed and had tattooed a picture of the deed on his right arm with the words under it, "Death to kings and tyrants."

Here was a king with his own condemnation indelibly stamped on his person. There was no eliminating it. The king was doomed to wear the now hated picture of the death of his sovereign till his own death should de-

The supreme object of the king of Sweden's life was to guard his secret. No valet was called upon to hand him his clothing when he dressed in the morning or to take it from him when he disrobed at night. The office of master of the robes was a sinecure. Had it not been for that which clung like a serpent to his arm be might there at times forgotten that he was a French peasant of whom another com-

moner monarch had made a king. But the accursed spot would not out. In the morning when he performed his ablutions there it was bared to his gaze. At night when he disrobed it stared at him as with the malicious eyes of a serpent.

In those days when a person was ill the doctors drew blood from him. This was done by lancing the right arm. There is a story that the king of Sweden fell ill, and the doctors suggested that he bare his right arm to be bled. The king refused. The doctors told his unajesty that if he did not permit them to bleed him they would not be responsible as to what might happen to him. The king would not yield, but bared his left arm. He was told that it would not be professional to bleed him on his left arm Nevertheless, since the king would not

yield, he was bled from his left arm.

The king recovered, but he was des tined to die in his hed. When his inst illness came upon him and he believed his end was approaching he sent for Dr. Gorgensen, his principal physician and charged him in case he died to see that his right arm was exposed to no one except himself. He alone was to possess the secret under a pledge that he would not reveal it. The physician made the pledge, promising that he would personally superintend the laying out of the body. The king did not exact a promise that the doctor would not examine the arm about which so much curiosity had been excited by the king's refusing to be bled from it. Gorgensen might consider it his duty to make the secret public. Having been confided with it and knowing that it did not affect the state, he would likely refrain from divulging it.

When the king was known to be dend Dr. Gorgensen sent every one out of the room and, having locked the doors, lifted the sleeve that covered the dead sovereign's right arm. There was the guillotine, the body strapped to it and the words "Death to kings and tyrants."

Many years had elapsed since that picture was made and those words written. Great had been the rise of the man who had stood looking on as one of the guard attending the execution of the king. Buf the doctor knew what the world knew-that the dead king had been a French peasant, a soldier in the ranks, and rumor had it that he had been present as one of the guard at the beheading of the king of France. -Gorgensen divined the

Strange it is that this peasant king was the only person whom Napoleon created a sovereign whose descendant now sits on a throne.

Corinthian Brass.
