ONLY BOOD CAT DEAD ONE SAYS GAME COMMISSION

Declares Pussy Is Dangerous Spreader Of Germs.

Although the New Jersey Legislature failed to pass the cat license law last Winter, several municipalities have declined to wait for the State to lead the way but have adopted local ordinances levying a feline tax. A wide-awake sentiment, especially in suburban towns, has ognize the cat the worst enemy of wild bird life but in these Jersey communities which have opened war on cats by local laws, human conservation has been the more vital ne, with health boards generally leading the

Promiment health authorities have expressed the belief that cats have had a large part in spreading infantile paralysis, now epidemic in New York's vicinity. Health officials for many years have regarded the cat as one of the most active agents in carrying disease germs into the home. Microbes find a snug loufing place in pussy's fur, and a child, innocently handling its pet, transers these germs to its hands ce to its mouth. Parents in localities threatened by the epidemic have been warned against permitting children to careas pet dogs

One outcome of the present fight against the plague is that many physicians siready have declared that they will join the movement to have the cat-tax bill passed by the next Legislature. They have adopted the slogan of the bird conservationist that "The only good cat is a dead ont." . So says the State Fish and Gume

Children under 16 from New Jersey cannot go into Pennsylvania now without a health er's certificate that they have not been exposed to infantile paralysis or in a neighborbood where it prevails.
