> Moist clay soils are naturally adapted to timothy. Successful stands may be secured on a wide range of soils from sandy loams to heavy clays. It is more difficult to scenre good stands on the lighter soils and the period of profitable mowing is usually shorter.

Good preparation of the soil must not be overlooked. The usual method of seeding timothy in the Fall with wheat or rye and slover in the Spring often fails to give the best results even through preparation of the soil may be good; because the accompanying crop, rye or wheat, takes the needed plant food and there may be much weed seed in the surface soil ready to start with the timothy. Fertilization should be such as to conform with the requirements of the grass which is to follow. Grain seeded after thorough preparation of the soil during the latter part of August will give a larger yield of hay than usually can be expected when seeded with grain in the cus-

If successful results are to be obtained, special care should be given to the preparation of the seed bed. Frequent and thorough cultiyation destroys weed seeds and promotes the clubility of plant food. Fine tilth produced in this way will also create conditions favo able to germination.

The last Federal census shows the total num ber of farms in the United States to be 6,361,508 containing 878,798,826 acres.

The land in farms represents 46.2 per cent, or less than one-half of the total land area of the country; Of the total acreage given only 478,451,750 acres are classed as "improved land." The balance comprises wood land and other animproved land in farms. The improved land given above is only about 25.1 per cent. o the total area of the country. The average size of farms, as shown by the last census is 188.1 ores, of which an average of 75.2 acres are improved, and 629 scres unimproved.

MUST BE YEAR OLD SPORTSMEN WARNED OF FEDERAL MIGRATORY REGULATIONS

OPEN GAME SEASONS DEFINED

Bag Limit On Pike In January Only —When Dogs May Be Taken In Woods and Fields To Be Trained Reed, Rail and Shore Birds Lawful Preyarts of September.

Under the new deer law the shooting of does as well as buck deer, over one year old is permitted. This will be a welcome change many gunners as it is practically impossible for a hunter to distinguish bucks from does in woodland when the deer are running. Only one deer a year may be taken and riffes, also shotguns of less than 12 guage, are illegal. The new law provides that it is filegal to have deer in possession on any day except those on which they may legally be killed and the baden of proof will be on those who have visited in their possession, on other days to prove it. was taken on one of the Wednesdays in season With the approach of the open season for shooting wild fowl, sportsmen are warned that the Federal regulations will be strictly inforced. Some misunderstanding has arisen from the fact that the various State laws for not always conform to the Federal regulati This is regarded as unfortunate but in suc cases the Department must insist upon the bservance of the Federal regulations.

The Department will consider any remendations submitted in good faith for amend. ment of the regulations, but will hold he public hearings thereon, nor will it amend the regulations prior to October 15, 1915.
