LIFE-LONG RESIDENT OF COUNTY

Asks Support of All Republican Voters—Believes in Choice of Party's Candidates By People At Primaries and Sounds Keynote of Dignified Campaign.

Petitions have been placed in circulation this week and are meeting with great favor throughout the County for Joseph R. Bartlett, candidate for Sheriff on the Republican ticket. Mr. Bartlett, who has served as Under Sheriff for the past three years, is a lifelong resident of Atlantic County, throughout the district and his efficient services as Under Sheriff have demonstrated his sound ability in the conduct of this office.

In announcing his candidacy for the office Mr. Bartlett takes occasion to affirm his belief in the choice of candidates by the direct vote of the people and sounds the keynote of a dignified campaign:

Courts Cost \$60,000.

In order to meet increased Court expenses the Board was obliged to make another transfer of funds. This time of \$15,000 from the Atlantic County Account to the Court Account. The Court appropriation for January was \$50,000 and added to this was \$500 left over from last year. In July it was necessary to make a transfer from the Bridge Road account of \$5,000. So for the Court expense this year has approached the \$60,000 mark with the heaviest term yet to come.

MUST FILE PETITIONS TO GET IN THE RACE

Two Days Left For Congressional Aspirants—Local Office Seekers Have Until August 26 To Formally Announce Candidacy.

Monday next, August 17, is the last day upon which Congressional petitions may be filed. Thirty days before the Primary Election, the time set for the petition filing. Candidates for Assembly, Sheriff, and the local municipal offices, such as constables, Justices of the Peace, Magistrates, Freeholders, Recorder, City Treasurer and Tax Collector have twenty days before the Primary, which falls on September 22, in which to file their petitions. This would set the last day upon which they may file as August 26.

SUPT. CRESSMAN EXPLAINS VOCATIONAL SCHOOL PURPOSES

Students Must Have Farm Land To Do Practical Work. In explanation of the intent and purposes of the Vocational School provided for last Wednesday by the Board of Freeholders, County Superintendent H. M. Cressman announced that the Board of Education intends to employ a superintendent for the Vocational School in agriculture and as many teachers as will be necessary to carry out their plan. Any boy or young man over fourteen years of age, who has passed beyond the 8th grade and engaged in farming pursuits may be enrolled in such school. Each boy on his own account must be engaged in some project such as market gardening, poultry keeping, fruit growing, dairying, bee culture and such other forms of agriculture as are profitable and practical.

Big Rush To Seashore.

Atlantic City officials of the Pennsylvania and the Reading Railroad Monday said the big figures had been reached in Sunday's traffic, and that the figures for the day were about equal to those of the corresponding day last year, which was the record day for that year.

Northfield Objects To Hospital.

Northfield Council has entered a vigorous protest against the establishment of the County Freeholders of a hospital for the tuberculous in that borough. A resolution and so determined are the Northfield people to prevent the building of a hospital on the site of the old county almshouse in their precincts that the Board decided to abandon the plan.
