JOHNSON PETITIONS FOR COUNTY CLERK MAKE APPEARANCE

EX-SHERIFF SURPRISED BY PAPERS OF WHICH HE HAD NO KNOWLEDGE

Has Not Consented To Be a Candidate But Friends Throughout District Look Upon His Nomination With Favor—Four Other Aspirants in the Field.

During the last few days petitions for Ex-Sheriff C. L. Johnson for the office of county clerk have made their appearance throughout the county, much to the surprise of Mr. Johnson, who was not aware of his nomination until yesterday and who endeavored to recall them as soon as he found they were in the field. Those who had the petitions were declined to give them up despite his declaration that he was not seeking the office and at latest reports hundreds of signatures are being secured in the hope that the popular young official can be prevailed upon to stand for the nomination.

Many of Johnson's friends in various sections of the county, who have urged him to enter the race for several months, say that he is the strongest candidate that the party can nominate and declare that he is popular in all sections of the county.

Asked what he knew concerning the petitions yesterday, Mr. Johnson said: "I know positively nothing about them, and I have not been able to learn who is responsible for their circulation. I am not a candidate for the office. Of course, if my party believed in the strongest candidate and wanted me to run, I would consider myself a poor Republican if I did not respond to the call."

The petitions are said to have met with unusual enthusiasm throughout the county and as one Republican put it: "It is a real pleasure to see a petition for Johnson—everybody wants to sign it and even Democrats would sign it by hundreds if permitted." The petition gives May's Landing as the Ex-Sheriff's residence and residents are giving it enthusiastic support.

Four other candidates are in the field for the Republican nomination: E. A. Parker, Lewis (Glen), E. R. Donnelly and Adolph Morgenweck. Wilson Seneaman and Andrew Orr are contestants for the Democratic nomination and John W. Parsons has been endorsed by the Progressives.

HEARING ON BURNS BILL

Justice Garrison Allows Writ To Show Cause For Mandamus.

Supreme Court Justice Garrison has allowed a writ to the Delective Agency to show cause why a writ of mandamus should not be issued to compel the Board of Freeholders of Atlantic County to pay the Burns Agency for expenses and services in connection with the concrete boardwalk plan hatched by Burns to trap Atlantic City Councilmen. The bill amounts to \$4,700. The Board of Freeholders were represented by former Judge E. A. Higgins, County Solicitor. The rule was made returnable at the next session of the Supreme Court.

The payment of this bill has been refused by a majority of the Board of Freeholders, who ever presented for over six months past. Some of the objections to the bill are that it is not a just charge against the County, is excessive and is not properly itemized. It includes charges of \$100 a day and expenses of half as much more.

ASSOCIATION DEFY ANSWERED

Contest For Blood Promised Between Rival Teams.

Edwin Woolbert, manager of the Pleasantville Baseball team, makes the statement through the Pleasantville "Press" that the local team will play May's Landing at any time and give them a guarantee of \$50 in case they should drop the game. The May's Landing team has claimed the championship of Atlantic County on the grounds that Pleasantville had refused to play them.

The management of the May's Landing Baseball Association will accept the offer so generously made by Manager Woolbert, of the Pleasantville team, of donating a \$50 guarantee to the County Capital boys providing they drop the game. They May's Landing Association will be ready at any date to meet them upon the diamond and as they have a game scheduled with the team on Saturday, August 23, the management states they will on hand providing the game is not cancelled as others were.

Railroad Blamed For Accident.

In the coroner's hearing and inquiry into the Buena accident, held at Pleasantville, it was testified that frequently the townspeople have petitioned the West Jersey and Seaboard Railroad for gates and gates have never been granted. It was shown by other witnesses that it has been the custom with the neighbors to run out and warn motorists of approaching trains because the view from the road is obscured by a house, tree and brush. It was sworn by several witnesses that the express train that killed Mrs. Hechtbach and her daughter blew a whistle as it approached the crossing, but evidently the rattle of the freight train hid the sound. The jury held the railroad an criminally negligent in not providing gates.

Burned Dredge Halts Bridge Work.

Work has been completely suspended on the new Buena City automobile bridge by the total destruction by fire of a big pile driver, employed in sinking supports for the inter-county bridge. The pile-driver was at work on the Ocean City end of the bridge. It burned fiercely, and hundreds gathered to watch the blaze. The other pile driver, working from the Somers Point end of the causeway-bridge was thrown against the shore Fast-Line bridge about two weeks ago, and wrecked, going down with its machinery. Work will be held up until other pile driving machinery can be procured.

Jacob Schick Dies Suddenly.

Hoisted at a table on Monday evening with several friends, Jacob Schick, a well-known keeper of Somers Point, Monday evening died before aid could be summoned. He expired. Deceased had been in the hotel business at that bay resort for a number of years and was well known and esteemed throughout the County.

"Bill" Lamb At Liberty.

"Bill" Lamb, former Boardwalk Inspector, who served a six months sentence in the County Jail for destroying election returns, was liberated yesterday morning following a writ of habeas corpus issued by Atlantic City in an order by Judge after paying the \$500 fine imposed in addition to his jail sentence.

ELIMINATE DEADLY CROSSINGS

Recommendations Made Yesterday By State Commissioner Lippincott.

Showing that many of the grade crossings on the railroads in the vicinity of the main highways between Camden and Atlantic City are dangerous and should be protected, the report of the investigation into the condition of the crossings just made by the State Motor Vehicle Department was yesterday submitted to the State Board of Public Utility Commissioners by State Motor Vehicle Commissioner Job H. Lippincott.

Commissioner Lippincott had Inspector Shlan investigate the grade crossings on the South Jersey roads, following the numerous fatal accidents which have occurred to automobile parties and others in this section of the State.

Regarding crossings in Atlantic County the report says: "Near May's Landing—Absecon Crossing one mile below May's Landing. A very dangerous crossing. No bell, no flagman and no other warning than an illuminated sign 250 feet distant, and warning sign. Heavy auto traffic. Gates should be installed."

In May's Landing—Sugar Hill Crossing, an oblique crossing. Approaching trains observed from the South by curve. No watchman, no gates no bells. Heavy auto traffic. Gates should be installed.

Main Street Crossing Near Station—No protection of any kind. This is the road to Truckhouse. Heavy auto traffic. Gates and bells should be installed.

May's Landing—Millville Pike, this road to Vineland, Bridgeton, Woodbury to Camden—no protection, no bells, no watchman, no gates, very dangerous, illuminated sign 250 feet from track and 500 feet sign. Motor cyclist killed probably three or four years ago. Heavy traffic. Gates should be installed.

Mistletoe Avenue—No protection other than sign within ten feet of track; had approach to the South. Not a great deal of traffic. Bell should be installed.

South—Atlantic County. No protection other than bell. Illuminated sign 250 feet. Day sign 200 feet. This is the crossing that the wife and daughter of Lieutenant Ross G. Schacht were killed on August 2, 1913. Heavy traffic. Gates should be installed.

SCIENCE AIDS FORESTRY

"Tree Doctor's" Operations Important Factor In Preservation of Trees For Many Municipalities—A Popular Public Project.


A group of interested spectators upon a city square are eagerly watching a man who is "doing something" to a tree. What the "something" is no one seems to know but the man himself. He has two assistants. One of them carries a bucket of tar and several brushes. The other has a rough box and a paddle for mixing small quantities of cement. The man has been observed working at the tree in intervals for several days. Now he is finishing his work. A number of branches have been cut off. Now the wounds are being coated with the tar so that they will not admit moisture and cause the tree to decay. At one side of the trunk is a good-sized hole. A squirrel used to live in it and hide nuts there. The man cleans out the nut shells and with sharp tins chips out all the decayed fibre down to the clean white wood. Now he is going to fill that hole with cement. After a few years, if he does his work well, the bark will grow over that filling so that there will hardly be a scar upon the trunk of the tree to indicate that

work was done.



Republican circles were pleased this week to learn that Carlton Godfrey, of Atlantic City, one of the foremost bankers and financiers of the city, they know hope the Ex. There once was a great rotten place that would soon have caused it to die.

The man who does this wonderful work is called a tree surgeon, and sometimes a tree dentist, because he puts fillings in trees. In just the same way that a dentist puts fillings in teeth, Mr. Godfrey, who is a tree surgeon, fills holes in trees which sometimes they have known and loved for years. There were never so many tree doctors at work in this country as are engaged this summer because the people in every State are becoming more interested in saving their trees.

Tree surgery is one of the newest callings, and one which is just beginning to be recognized. The facilities for acquiring the profession of tree surgery are limited as yet to less than half a dozen institutions which have formed special departments for this work. Consequently tree doctors are not plentiful and their remuneration seems enormous to those who have never stopped to consider the real value a tree is to a town or community.

The Mayor of a Western city said last year, "Five thousand dollars is a modest estimate of the value of one of the big chestnuts belonging to this town, and we are going to save them if possible." So a tree surgeon was brought from the East. He put out iron bolts through both of the large branches of one of the trees, just where they began to divide. In this way he prevented it splitting apart as several similar trees in the same town had done. He cleaned out rotten places and filled up cavities with cement. He cut off branches and unwieldy limbs. For three weeks he tended to the trees of that town, visiting each daily as a physician does his patients. When all were in good order he presented a bill for five hundred dollars, which the town was glad to pay.

Tree surgery is distinct from forestry work although eventually it will be done from one of the forests of study in the forestry schools. Thousands of trees valuable both for their benefit to their communities and for historic association have been ruthlessly sacrificed in the past because of the ignorance and neglect of those who should have cared for them.

Every rotten spot upon a tree is the result of some wound or injury which may have been received when the tree was young. Because it was neglected it developed rot and decay just as the neglected wound of an animal may suppurate and produce serious conditions. Every cut or wound made in a tree should be promptly protected by a coating of tar or lead paint applied from two to four days after the cutting so that the surface may be dry enough to absorb it properly. In exceptional cases this coating may be applied immediately after the cutting, when to do later would necessitate the dangerous reclimbing of a high tree. Large wounds should be inspected each year and painted or tarred until they are completely healed over. If cracks or scars appear upon the surface, the oldest is an elm upon the Southern corner of the White House lawn upon which \$100 has recently been expended for treatment. According to authentic records of the War Department this tree was planted by John Quincy Adams.

SCHOOL FOR DEAF GROWING

Nearly Two Hundred Will Be Enrolled In September.

With ample facilities to accommodate two hundred students, the New Jersey school for the deaf at Trenton will reopen in September with an enrollment of 175 students, which number surpasses that of last year by 20 students. With the new dormitory finished and extensive renovations pending completion, Superintendent John P. Walker expects the institution to more than uphold its record of efficiency.

This institution is the only one of its kind in the State. There are many institutions for the deaf, known as day schools or district institutions. It is generally known that an afflicted child is a spoiled child. The pity it provokes often leads to this end. It is humored and petted, and often indulges many habits which can only be habituated by association with those of its kind, with which it receives share and share alike.
