

Some instances have been called to the attention of the Board of married men whose wives have been self-supporting and if it proves true that these men have been neglecting their families and contributing little or nothing to their support they stand a good chance of shouldering arms. Their pay of \$80 a month, or any part of it, may be assigned to their families and paid directly to their dependents.

The Exemption Board is endeavoring to be absolutely air and impartial in every instance and has an arduous and serious task before it. Two hundred fourteen men must be selected from those registered for the county's quots and for everyone excused, another man has to take his place. The Board has to consider not only the man who wants to be exculed or is endeavoring to shirk his duty, but the man next in order of call. The first 214 men on the list were liable for duty first, and the Board owes it to every man further down the list to see to it that no one escapes that duty

LOOKING ON THE BRIGHT SIDE OF FRENCH BATTLE FIELDS

War Not Altogether "Hell" As So Frequently Declared.

That the battle front in France to which American soldiers are going has its brighter side, besort out strongly by John Darrett, Director of the Pas not generally appreciated, is American Union, who says:

"So much is said about the terrible phases. of war which frighten parents, discourage enlisting, and inspire efforts at exemption, that something should be said without exaggeration about the brighter conditions upon and behind the firing line. Although every man who fights or visits the front agrees that the scenes and happenings in 'no man's land 'and the advance trenches during actual battle are literally horrible, he knows that there are other phases of the situation which prove that war is not, after all, entirely 'bell.'

"Only a very small percentage of the men are engaged in battle, and those stationed at the front are relieved every few days. At ar intervals the men in the advan Union National Bank of Atlantic City va. are brought back beyond the reach of fire for rest and change, and a certain percentage of them are furloughed to visit London or Paris.

"In the rest camps there are always sports, games, amaieur theatricals and other amusements. There is always special attention given to the religious needs of the soldiers, not offensive but sympathetic, under chaplains of the representative faiths.

"Those actually kitled do not average above I in 10 and not more than 3 in 10 are severely rounded, while a surprisingly large percentage the American statistician, make war seem a of those injured in battle recover. Miss good deal less dreadful from the viewpoint of caring for the wounded and sick, from the man who enlists or is called for selective carrying men off the battle field until they are finally turned out of the hospitals far away from the din of the struggle, is developed to a perfection that can only be appreciated by hose who see it working out.

"Cases of real cowardice and desertion are so rare as to be hardly the subject of comment or discussion. The esprit de corps of the rank and file, the co-operation of every man for the rope and in this country since the war began good of all, their team play, and their intense desire to punish the enemy impress all ob-

"The facilities for feeding the soldiers, both at the front and in the rear, including the most advanced trenches, are astonishingly perfected and very seldom is there any complaint as to the quantity or equality of the food. Arrangements for mail, even for the men under fire, are almost as efficient as those in cities

during peace time. "There is no question that the experience at the front, no matter how terrible, instead of making brutes of the men and debasing them, makes them more human, more sympathetic, more unseifish, and better men generally than they were before. Although the fearful strain of the battle front affects harmfully the nerves and strength of many men, the great majority who are unwounded are in splendid physical condition and will not come out of the war mental and hodily wrecks, as has been so often predicted."

Capacity Thousand Horse Power-Operate Entire Industry. The new steam turbine and generator at the

Sufficient power will be generated by the

turbine to operate the industry without water power, with enough more to run prospective extensions of the mill, which Supt. Charles H. Kears hopes to greatly enlarge within a few years. A generator developing 800 horse power will be installed to be operated by water power, so altogether 1,300 home power will be avail-


