Fair skies favored the yachtsmen Saturday last when the second annual regatla of the May's Landing Yacht Club was held at Catawba on the Great Egg Harbor River. The speed boat, "Caroline," ('apt. William H. Henszey, of Ocean City, gave the spectators a treat by racing over the course at a rate of twenty-four miles an hour, probably the best time ever made on the Great Egg Harbor. Com. Thompson was high in his praise of the course and said it was one of the best anywhere along the

coast for speed-boat racing. Several scores of guests left the wharf here at two o'clock in the large power barge of Capt. GARNER GETS FIVE YEARS FOR SHOOTING AT GIRL

PLEADED GUILTY BEFORE LAW JUDGE HIGBEE.

ung Poole Behind Trenton Bars One Year For Selling Opium-Several Other Evildoers Confess Guilt and Receive Sentence.

For attempting to shoot his former sweeteart, Bertha Johnson, last Spring at Ventnor while under the influence of liquor, Howard Garner, colored, was sentenced Wednesday at special session of court held by Law Judge L. A. Higbee to a term of five years at hard labor in State Prison. Garner pleaded guilty to the charge.

Jung Poole, a Chinaman, charged with selling opium at Atlantic City, was adjudged guilty after a trial without jury and sentenced to a term of one year in State Prison. The evidence of Detective George Herbert and of other witnesses was to the effect that Poole sold apium to men addicted to its use at restaurants and pool rooms.

Sentence was suspended on John Brown, charged with stealing a clock; William Wagner, larceny; Walter Clark and Alfred Angell, malacious mischief; Casey Mason, who stole a wheelbarrow and a load of moss-bunkers and John Haley, charged with assaulting his wife. Harry D. Harding was sentenced to six months in the County Jail for larceny of an automobile tire; his partner, James Gerard,

charged jointly with him, was discharged.
