FARM DEMONSTRATOR WILL HAVE HIS OFFICE HERE IN COURT HOUSE

COUNTY CAPITAL, BEST LOCATION SAYS PROF. ALVA AGEE

TO BEGIN WORK IN NOVEMBER

New Official Chosen By State Experiment Station May Skilled In Soil Analysis, Mixing Of Fertilizers—Duty To Help And Advise Every Farmer No Matter How Small His Resources.

Several towns have been eager to have the office of County Farm Demonstrator established therein, but Prof. Alva Agee has decided that the County Capital, which is conveniently located with respect to the various farming districts, is the proper place for the office. Five hundred acres here and good roads connect with Buena Vista Township, Hammonton, Cogden, Germania, English Creek, etc.

The Demonstrator will be a man skilled in chemical analysis of soils, mixing of fertilizers, etc., in addition to being a successful farmer, will not give his work until November. He will be given an office in the Court House where he will be one day a week, spending the other seven at the farm.

With pleasure has been given by the Board of Freeholders by farmers throughout the County for their establishment of this department. The Demonstrator will be at the call of every county farmer, however small his place, to give advice and suggestions.

In a letter yesterday to Preacher Ira T. B. Smith Prof. Alva Agee, head of the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Stations, says:

"It now seems quite clear to me that our County Superintendent of Farm Demonstration should be located in the County Seat, where he may have an office in the Court House, and where he would meet many farmers who naturally come to the County Seat. Our Board of Managers of the Experiment Station has appointed Mr. Douglass, and I shall take the matter up with him at a little later."

"I wish again to express my appreciation of the thoroughly good work you have done in bringing this organization about."

RICHARDS LEADS RACE IN CONGRESS FIGHT

RECKLESS DRIVING CAUSES THREE AUTO ACCIDENTS

Speeding Car Crashed Into Farmer's Team And Overturned.

Three persons were injured, two seriously, in a collision between an automobile and a team of horses on Monday Boulevard shortly after midnight Tuesday morning. The automobile, owned by Michael McLean, of Germantown, Pa., is said to have been going fifty miles an hour when it crashed into the horses. Frank Agnew, McLean's driver, lost an eye and sustained internal injuries.

The heavy car barely missed a wagon driven by Earl Meyers, and dashed into his house, dislodging one of its serious injury. The other, the automobile, turned a complete somersault, according to James Barnes and Samuel English, farmers, who were driving their wagons directly behind that of McLean.

A second smash occurred on the Port Republic road, when a car belonging to Schmidtsbach, a Philadelphia cottager, was wrecked by four horses who stood it from Atlantic City. One of the four was severely injured.

In a third motor crash, Samuel Balfern, of Atlantic City, escaped with bruises and扭伤, when he was bumped by a car owned and driven by A. B. Thomas, of Wayne, Pa., visitor.

Sutherland, a broken knee-cap, a 19-year-old youth named Condie, was lodged in the County jail Thursday evening charged with being connected with the theft and wrecking of the Schmidtsbach's car. The police are looking for the driver of a car bearing the New Jersey license 758, which farmers state they saw the chauffeur stop alongside the wrecked car and deliberately cut the straps fastening the tires, throw the tires into the machine and proceed.

One of the party, giving his name as George Clements, of Washington, D. C., is in serious condition at the Atlantic City Hospital. The others have not been found.

CALVIN URGES PREACHERS TO OBSERVE SCHOOL SUNDAY

Believes Home And Church Should Co-operate With Teachers.

Calvin H. Kendall, Commissioner of Education, with the approval of Governor James F. Fielder, has issued the following recommendation to the clergy and the people of New Jersey:

"Upon the opening of our schools and colleges hundreds of thousands of young people in the State will return to their studies. Though these educational institutions afford education and various means of securing an education, many of those employing the privileges cannot fully appreciate the provision that is being made for their training."

"In order that pupils, teachers, parents and citizens may more fully realize the aims and advantages of our educational institutions, the clergy of the State are invited to join the respective congregations in observing an educational Sunday, the thirtieth of September.

"The educational opportunities provided for securing an education might be explained and the value resulting therefrom set forth. The need of cooperation on the part of parents and teachers might be emphasized to the end that both may endeavor to search out and respect the individuality of pupils in their effort to develop those habits of mind and traits of character which distinguish the efficient citizen."
