STOKES AGREES TO RUN

Did Not Seek Nomination for Oov ernor But Ready To Heed Call of His Party-Popular Through-

Former Governor Edward C. Stokes is nov in the field as "a receptive and not a selfseeking candidate" for the Republican nomination for Governor. Mr. Stokes announced ancy bills for hotels, taxicabs, etc. The Free his candidacy Tuesday and declared that in civic duty.



In making his declaration Mr. Stokes an ounced that he did not propose to proclaim his platform to the world, believing that under the Geran haw that duty properly rests with the State convention. He promised neverthe ess to issue a statement in the near future outlining the work of the party on progressive measures and declaring in general what he be ieves should be its position regarding pro gressive policies and party organization.

Mr. Stokes made it plain that it was in n wise his desire to interfere with the ambition of any other candidate for the Governorship. He is willing to submit his candidacy to the voters of his party and to abide by the result. In his statement Mr. Stokes said:

"I have had a large number of requests is person, by letter, by petition and by resolution to become a candidate for the Republican nomination for Covernor. I have decided to ascertain how far those requests represent real substantial public scutiment on this question and to that end I shall submit my name as a candidate for the nomination for Governor to the Republican primaries in accordance wit the laws of the State,

"My attitude toward this honor must by thi time be well understood. I have not rought it. I have been Governor of this State, and for me a second term awakens no personal ambitions The only incentive I could have would be one of civic daty. If the people think I can be of service in this emergency I am bound to consider their wishes. Those wishes must first be expressed at the primary. If the voters think some one else can serve them better or as wellshould be their candidate, and so express best fight I can for the principles and policies of the party from the day of the nomination to the day of celection. I am subject to the party call if the call is made by the rank and file,"
