BURNS SUES FREEHOLDERS

Writs Served Yesterday Upon Each Member of County Board.

Writs were served yesterday upon each member of the Atlantic County Board of Chosen Freeholders, issued out of the Supreme Court, on application for mandamus for writs to show cause in the suit of the William J. Burns Detective Agency against the Board, which has steadfastly refused to pay the \$5,700 bill rendered by Burns. Items on the bill, which the Freeholders consider exorbitant, include charges of \$100 a day and expenses of half as much more, incurred in fancy bills for hotels, taxicabs, etc. The Freeholders believe that those who brought Burns to the attention to establish his "plant" to trap criminals should pay the bill.

The notices served yesterday read as follows: "It is on this eleventh day of August, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, ordered that the Board of Chosen Freeholders of the County of Atlantic show cause before the Supreme Court of this State, at the State House in the City of Trenton, on the first Tuesday of November, next, at the hour of eleven o'clock in the forenoon of that day or as soon thereafter as counsel can be found thereon, why a Writ of Preliminary Mandamus or an Alternative Mandamus, as the Court shall then determine, shall not issue out of said Court directed to the said Board of Chosen Freeholders of the County of Atlantic, commanding the said Board to pay the sum of fifty-seven hundred dollars and twenty-five cents with interest thereon from the eleventh day of February, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, until paid, for the bill of the William J. Burns Detective Agency, and certified and approved by Honorable Samuel Kaish, Justice of the Supreme Court and the presiding Judge of the Court of Oyer and Terminer of the County of Atlantic, for services rendered by the Board at the instance of the Prosecutor of the Pleas of Atlantic County and the Attorney General of the State of New Jersey, assigned by the said Justice of the Supreme Court for the prosecution of the criminal business in Atlantic County, to the investigation of the same and prosecution of certain 'graft' election frauds and other criminal violations in Atlantic County."

"It is further ordered that a copy of this rule, which need not be certified, be served upon the said Board of Chosen Freeholders of Atlantic County within fifteen days from the date of this order, and that both parties be privileged to take testimony before a Supreme Court Commissioner to be used on the argument of this rule upon two days notice in writing.

STOKES AGREES TO RUN

Did Not Seek Nomination for Governor But Ready To Head Call of His Party—Popular Throughout State.

Former Governor Edward C. Stokes is known in the field as "a receptive and not a self-seeking candidate" for the Republican nomination for Governor. Mr. Stokes announced his candidacy Tuesday and declared that in entering the contest he was not prompted by personal ambition, but merely by a sense of civic duty.



In making his declaration Mr. Stokes announced that he did not propose to podium his platform to the world, believing that under the terms that duty properly rests with the State convention. He promised nevertheless to issue a statement in the near future outlining the work of the party on progressive measures and declaring in general that he believes should be its position regarding progressive policies and party organization.

Mr. Stokes made it plain that it was in no wise his desire to interfere with the ambitions of any other candidate for the Governorship. He is willing to submit his candidacy to the voters of his party and to abide by the result. In his statement Mr. Stokes said:

"I have had a large number of requests in person, by letter, by petition and by resolution to become a candidate for the Republican nomination for Governor. I have decided to ascertain how far these requests represent real and substantial public sentiment on this question and to that end I shall submit my name as a candidate for the nomination for Governor to the Republican primaries in accordance with the laws of the State."

"My attitude toward this honor must by this time have been understood. I have not sought it. I have been Governor of this State, and for me a second term awakens no personal ambitions. The only incentive I could have would be one of civic duty. If the people think I can best serve in this emergency I am bound to consider their wishes. Those wishes must first be expressed at the primary. If the voters think some one else can serve them better or as well I shall be entirely content. If they feel that I should be their candidate, and so express themselves at the primary, I shall make the best fight I can for the principles and policies of the party from the day of the nomination to the day of election. I am subject to the party call if the call is made by the rank and file."

ARRESTED, FARMER TAKES LIFE

Wife Swore Out Warrant For Coming Home Intoxicated.

Called in from his sweet potato field by a constable who informed him that he had a warrant for his arrest, sworn out by his wife, Henry D. Dard, aged 49, a farmer living at Farmington, a small hamlet near Pleasantville, went upstairs to his room and slashed his throat with a razor. Fifteen minutes later the constable and Mrs. Dard found him dying and ere they could obtain doctors he had expired.

Burn was a fairly industrious farmer, but liquor was his failing. Wednesday night he went to his home drunk and started a row with his wife. When he threatened to murder her, Mrs. Dard and her 17-year-old daughter, Hazel, sought shelter for the night at the home of neighbors named Hanceman. The next morning the frightened woman appeared before Magistrate Weeks, of Pleasantville, and swore a warrant for the man's arrest.

McMurtree and Mrs. Dard waited for fifteen minutes for Dard to "wash up," and then they began to suspect something. Going upstairs to the front room, McMurtree found the farmer lying on the floor in a pool of blood, clutching firmly in his right hand was a razor, with which he had slashed his throat from ear to ear, severing the jugular. Four doctors were summoned, but by the time they reached the house Burn was dead.
