Yield This Year Lighter Than Usual And Prices Low.

Pointo growers of South Jorsey will divide \$2,000,000 as their share of the receipts from the ale of the early potato crop, the last of which was dug and shipped away this week. The yleid per acro has not been as large as usual this year, but the harvest of potatoes in the aggregate is big and will run close to 5,000 cars. Prices are just about half of what they were last year. Fallure of the crop in other parts of the country then sent the prices souring, and Sent To States Prison - Chef buyers paid as high as \$1 a barrel at the Convicted of Chasing Wife With station for the best of the tubers. This year they are giving \$2 a barrel and less, as there is a good yield of potatoes elsewhere.

Because of the low prices of the tubers some of the big buyers have been speculating and holding their polatoes for a better market. Since there has been a downward tendency in prices, the speculators have nearly all lost out, and some of the potatoes have been damaged by rot by holding them too long on the sidings It is estimated that at one time this week there were 400 cars of notatoes on siding either because of a slow market or speculation. Most of the Jersey potatoes this year have been dis-posed of in the Eastern markets, as the crop in the West has been heavy. The potatoes from this section ere entered all over the states, two carloads having gone to Florida, while the points to which big shipments have been made are New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Detroit,

Cleveland and Pittsburgh. The bulk of the crop has been the Irish cobbler variety, which thrives in the soil here in the lower end of the State.
