TWELVE HUNDRED TO BE CALLED

Sixty-one more seldiers were secured from Atlantic County this week for Uncle Bam, when the Exemption Board accepted 40 who did not claim exemption and denied exemp tion to 21. There were 83 on the list previously and one, Wilbur Measley, of Hammonton, was exempted this week by the District Board at Trenton because of extensive agricultural interests. This makes Atlantic County's present number available 148. The namber ann oned and examined to date le 730, so it appears that in the neighborhood of 1,200 registrants will have to be called to fill the first quois. Examinations will be contined next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday,

The first seventy men on the list will prote ably be summaned to entrain for Camp Dix Wrightstown, N. J., on September 4, but the date has not been definitely fixed. The first contingent will be called in the order of their liability as determined by their draft numbers. The men will be called to assemble at the Court House and will leave on a special train, in charge of a temporary sommander to be chosen from among the number by the Board. The second contingent will likely be called in October and the third in November but no definite announcement as to this has yet been made by the War Department. From the time they receive notice of their call the men sum-moned will be in the military service of the United States and subject to military law.

Exemptions are being passed upon by the Board as fast as affidavits are filed and while married men generally are being discharged for the present, no hard and fast rule has been adopted and where husbands have been neglecting their families their plaims are being streed down. Comparatively few claims for discharge on the ground of dependent parents have been allowed, as in most instances these have proven to be without real foundation Beveral men married since the draft, some right after they received notice to appear for examination, have been refused exemption

The Board yesterday received information that leads them to believe one claim of exemption allowed last week was secured under misrepresentations and has ordered a further investigation. If it develops that the exemp-tion was not warranted it will be revoked and the registrant placed on the list of those liable for service. The Board will welcome information from any responsible source regarding those who have already been exempted or are now asking for exemption.

Grave responsibility rests upon the Board in deciding every claim, for in almost every instance there are circumstances that command deemayinpathy for those who are called upon to part with loved ones. No amount of sympathy, however, can be allowed to away the Board: it is bound by strict orders from the War Department and these take into consideration only the actual de dency of relatives. In this connection is should be noted that the government, which pays its soldiers \$30 a month, expects them to end \$25 of this home: and figuring the cost of board at \$5.00 a week, this is the equivalent of \$560 a year. In other words the soldier can send home \$300 at least a year, for all his ne mary expenses in the way of clothing medical attention, board, etc., are borne by the government. This money can be assigned by the soldier and sent directly every month by

the War Department to those at home. As vegetable seed will probably be high-priced and scarce nextyear,gardeners should save some of their seed. In saving seeds of beans of all kinds, can talouper, cucumbers, eggplants

s, peppers, pumpkins, squash, tomatoes and watermelons select the plants which show the strongest growth and least disease and produce early and abundantly the most desirable fruits. Allow the fruit to remain on the plant until thoroughly ripe.

and squash, scrape out the seed, and allow it. to stand and ferment until the next day, During this time the son pulp around the seek will have disintegrated enough so that the seed may be easily washed out. Eggplants add tomatoss should be broken up and allowed to stand for a day.

Pepper seed may be obtained by cutting around the shoulder of the pepper, pulling out the seed receptacle, and rubbing off the clean Mr. John Makepeses w eeds. Root crops, cabbage, celery, etc., produce seed satisfactorily only after the plants ave been stored over Winter.

The annual loss from the use of poor seed is inestimable and generally quite needless. Poor or weak seed, or seed of glow-yielding or ill-

Such grain is worth more for seed than for feed and should command a high price, especially if recleaned. "This fear dates from the Thirty Years' War, the war which commenced in 1615 and was of Westphalia was concluded, Germany was almost a desert. Its population had fallen from 20,060,000 to 4,000,000. The few remaining people were so starved that cannibalism was openly practiced. In the German States polygamy was legalised and was a recognized intitution for many years thereafter.




