## PLEADS FOR BETTER SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

NECESSARY FOR GOOD WORK SAYS SUPERVISOR.

Vacation Days Over For Township Pupils—New Term Open Tuesday Next With Improved Facilities For Education.

A strong plea for better attendance of children at the several public schools of this town was made by Prof. S. G. Huber, Superintendent, who believes good attendance necessary for good work. The new school term, which opens next Tuesday, will find the Township Schools better equipped both for instruction and for the comfort and health of pupils that they have ever been and an endeavor will be made to establish a new record for attendance and efficiency during the term.

The following communication from Prof. Huber speaks for itself:

"The public schools of Hamilton Township will open on Tuesday next, September 5, for the term. The vacation given pupils in this district is longer than that given to pupils in large cities. It is important that pupils should start at the beginning of the term so that they may reap the benefit of review work of the previous term, when necessary, and to get the foundation of the new year work that is once taken up."

"It is not presumed by the teachers that the pupils remember everything just as they did last Spring when school closed and therefore a few weeks may be very profitably spent in again covering ground that had been covered last year. It is very important that pupils' work during the first part of the year that he present when this review work is done. In respect to the new work at once entered upon, it is likewise important that he be in attendance for his intelligent understanding of it often depends upon the manner in which the work is outlined and its purpose explained at the start."

"There is another matter, much discussed and by many people carried to extreme in either direction, to which I should like to call attention—namely, home-study. There are some very intelligent people who would have pupils do no studying at home at all, if studying were very difficult. There are others who would have us practice to the detriment of the pupil, and in their zeal to prevent this have gone to the other extreme and banished it entirely. Since fire, if not properly controlled has often injured people, would it not be reasonable to banish fire from our mode of life?"

"Again parents have come to me and told me that their children set up until midnight, sparred on either by fear or ambition, in order to get their lessons. This is all wrong, of course, especially if a pupil makes a practice of doing this."

"What we truly believe will be of lasting benefit to pupils of the timorous and high school grades is a regular and continued home study of one to two hours each evening for six evenings a week, not a葈eeks, but a few evenings and then no home work for a week but a continued application. Studying like many other things is a habit and is susceptible of cultivation and in fact in most cases must be cultivated in order to become a habit."

"What we would strongly urge then for the *future* of your children is that those from say the seventh grade up, be required to spend an hour or two, (not more than two), on their school work at home each day for five days of the week during the coming term. We believe it will pay your children not only in the material advantages they may gain, but in the self respect which comes from an intelligent comprehension of the work they are doing and in the fact that there is system and order in the world about them."

## COUNTY PETITIONS FILED.

Candidates Place Nomination Papers in Hands of County Clerk.

Nominating papers for every candidate on the Republican County Ticket, were filed Thursday at the office of the County Clerk, containing nearly three hundred names of leading citizens of Atlantic City and County. The papers filed were those of Robert H. Jengsler for Sheriff, Carlton Godfrey and Emerson Rilemire for Assembly, Dr. T. R. Tugard and Dr. Myrtle Frank for Coroner.

The Republican nomination papers bore the names of seventeen May's Landing voters, as follows: Albert C. Abbott, D. E. Izard, Charles M. Kunkel, Thomas J. L. Kunkel, Dr. A. J. L. Kunkel, Rev.
